In the event of an incident involving a security vehicle, take note of the number on the vehicle. Report these details, together with the time, date and nature of experience. Kindly provide this information to the Security Management, and



they will investigate the incident and action correctional measures accordingly.

Please share with family, friends and employees.

- Plan your journey. This includes deciding on the kinds of transport you intend using. Get to know the timetables.
- Ensure you know the distance, direction and time it takes to get to your destination.
- Avoid using vehicles that are in a poor, non-roadworthy condition. Your safety depends on the state of the vehicle you choose to travel in.
- Avoid overcrowded vehicles or train compartments.
- Be alert at all times and don't fall asleep while using public transport, especially when travelling by yourself.

- If you are followed when you exit a vehicle/station, go to the nearest well-lit populated area, call the police or scream for help.
- Have your exact fare ready and keep your bags close to your body. If you carry a handbag or backpack, make sure the straps are secure and strong.

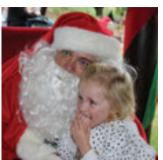

Guiding the hearts and minds of tomorrow's leaders

FWG Gardening Club

The Gardening Club met on 22 November for the last time in 2018. Eighteen of our members celebrated the start of the Festive Season; there were 3 super gardening prizes won in a lucky draw; and awards and recognition were given to our fantastic Chair Lady Morag, our new Chair Lady Jean was welcomed and our previous knowledgeable Chair Lady Irene was thanked.

ohn Moody held our complete attention in his enlightening talk on how to make compost. (See alongside for more details.)

John worked originally in the AECI Research laboratories with a team who developed an ideal fertiliser for mielies for South African farmers. He



later started a large commercial scale compost business which he ran for a few years. This compost operation is now owned by Turfnet.

HOW TO MAKE COMPOST

To build a compost heap in your garden, you need an enclosure made of fine chicken wire or you can buy a plastic one from a hardware store. It must have holes all the way round to allow air into it. The enclosure or compost bin should have a lid or cover to allow easy access to ensure good weekly mixing. Remember, too much moisture is also not good for the process.

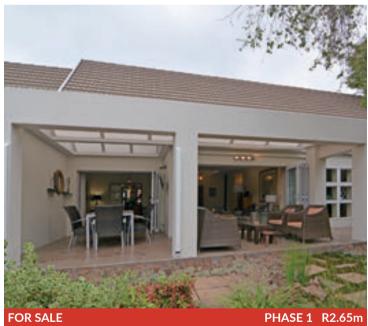
The compost must be made up of layers of grass cuttings, leaves, flowers, fruit and vegetable peels from the kitchen. Paper can also be added but it should be shredded and have

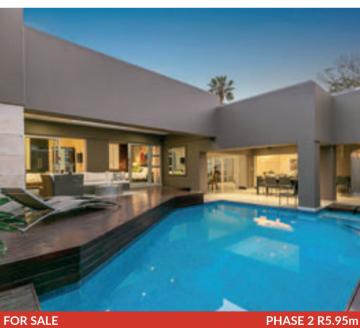

very little printing on it. Twigs are also satisfactory provided they are cut into small pieces. Banana skins are ideal, provided they are cut into small pieces. Fruit skins are also good but it is best not to add too many pips.

One always wonders about the addition of seeds and pips. They can be added in moderation as, if the compost reach a temperature of about 55°C and above, the weeds, seeds and pips will not survive.

Accelerators can be used, and standard types are available at nurseries. Certain fertilisers high in nitrogen such as LAN are also often added as accelerators but this will only work if there are fungi or micro-organisms present. Another method is to add a small quantity of ready-made compost as this will help to get the reaction going.

Yeast, watered down, can also be added to promote the decomposition of the waste. A cube of yeast bought from the local supermarket dissolved in at least a litre of water is sufficient for about one cubic metre of compost. The yeast solution should be well dispersed. Remember, it isn't a good idea to add too much yeast, as it will rapidly multiply by itself, provided the temperature is right. This happens particularly once the compost starts to increase in temperature.

A thermometer placed in the centre of the heap should reach around 55°C to 65°C (131°F - 149°F). This means the micro-organisms and fungi are working and the decomposition is taking place.

A number of other items can be added to the compost. Ash from wood fires is good for the heap. Briquettes can also be added, provided they are completely burnt.

Coal ash in small quantities is also good but, once again, it must be completely burnt out. These extra ingredients certainly add the trace elements needed in the final mix.

Fertilisers can be used to boost the potassium and phosphate requirements. Often a general fertiliser like 232 should be used and once again it must be







carefully distributed throughout the mix. In this case the nitrogen is not vital as the mulch of decomposed plant matter always contains a lot of nitrogen. Nitrogen can be added later, if necessary.

The moisture should be maintained at about 50%. This, with air, introduces oxygen, to ensure the decomposition reaction.

Commercial types of compost you can buy:

- **1. Lawn dressing:** this is made up of fine compost with at least 25% top soil.
- 2. Fine compost: compost where the larger particles like sticks have been removed.

- Coarse compost: this composition has a mixture of large particles and fine materials.
- 4. Potting soil: this contains fine compost with equal amounts of soil that does not contain a lot of clay, but the mixture should be able to hold its moisture. Sometimes vermiculite is added with a little 232 fertiliser.

YOUR CHILD MIGHT BE MISDIAGNOSED

Visual skills might be the problem and not ADD/ADHD

Your child enjoys listening to the teacher reading but as soon as he has to read, or do homework, he loses concentration and interest, displaying signs and symptoms of ADD/ADHD. Unknown to many parents, ADD/ADHD is not always the correct diagnosis. Current research in the US indicates that approximately 1 out of 4 children and 7 out of 10 juvenile delinquents have vision problems that interfere with their ability to effectively respond to the educational system.

ision is like walking and talking – it is a learnt skill. It's a complex process involving many visual skills that race along more than 65% of all pathways to the brain. Deficiencies in any one or more than one of these skills could be masquerading as ADHD. These skills include eye movement control, focusing far to near, sustaining clear focus, eye teaming ability, depth perception, eye hand co-ordination, visual form perception and memory.

The vision chart that we have all come to rely on was developed in 1892. It screens for distance vision, not near vision nor any of the critical visual skills required for learning. Since it only picks up 5% of all visual problems, undetected vision problems such as eye tracking, eye coordination, eye teaming and eye focusing may be misdiagnosed as ADD/ADHD, since these children skip and re-read words, have poor reading comprehension, take a longer time to do homework and show a short attention span when doing close work.

- According to the EYE Centre for Children's Vision, Learning and Technology, 25% of children today have vision issues impacting learning. In a survey of one million children, that represents 250 000 children in need.
- About 90 000 children need eye glasses

for near-sightedness (myopia). Distance and near vision screening WILL DETECT these problems in children.

- About 130 000 children need eye glasses to correct far sightedness (hyperopia). Distance and near vision screening WILL NOT DETECT most of the children at risk of this condition.
- 200 000 children will have amblyopia (lazy eye). Distance and near vision screening WILL DETECT these children at risk.
- 30 000 children have strabismus or an eye turn. Distance and near vision screening WILL MISS most of these children at risk of this condition.
- 50 000 have binocular/ eye focusing instability like convergence insufficiency. Distance and near vision screening WILL MISS most of the children at risk of this condition.
- Few people realise that many visual performance problems are identical to the common ADHD symptoms. As a result, ADHD has surged to epidemic proportions. Consequently, huge numbers of children are medicated with Ritalin, Adderal, Dexedrine, Concerta and other medications and are put into special education classes with special accommodations.

WHAT IS 20/20 VISION AND WHY IS IT ONLY PART OF THE PICTURE?

The best known visual ability is referred



to as 20/20 eyesight. Unfortunately, 20/20 eyesight with or without glasses does not mean that, during learning, a child can see clearly for more than a few minutes. It also does not mean that your child has depth perception and localisation skills (particularly important for night driving when your child becomes an adult), or that your child is free from vision-related headaches. All 20/20 means is that your child can call out six small letters on a doctor's chart. Therefore, in addition to 20/20 vision, we need to assess several key visual abilities that are ignored during most eye examinations. These are:

EYE MUSCLE COORDINATION

Each eye has six sets of muscles, just like many parts of the body. The brain must coordinate these muscles so your child can see comfortably and efficiently. Both eyes need to work together, even under

stressful conditions. If this coordination is difficult or even off a little bit, eyesight may be clear at times and blurred or double at times. Your child's unconscious efforts to prevent blurred or double vision can cause premature fatigue, or loss of attention and comprehension during reading and learning. Further, some eye muscle coordination problems can reduce depth perception for driving and sports. Poor eye muscle coordination can even cause cross-eye or lazy eye.

EYE-TEAMING (BINOCULAR VISION)

Eye-teaming is the ability of the two eyes to align and team together to enable a child to judge his or her orientation in space and have depth perception. The technical term for this ability is 'binocular vision'. A student experiencing eyeteaming difficulties can be observed to cover one of his eyes, blink frequently, exhibit poor desk posture, tire easily when reading and take extended periods of time to complete homework.

FOCUSING NEAR-TO-FAR

This is the ability to make the eyes look quickly from near to far and back again without momentary blur, conscious effort or discomfort. A student experiencing a near-to-far focusing difficulty will get frustrated and have trouble copying from a book, and even greater difficulty copying from the board.

VISUAL TRACKING AND PERIPHERAL VISION

Visual tracking refers to how quickly and accurately we move our eyes across a line of print, look at symbols (such as numbers, letters and words) so we can remember what to call them, and get the sounds out of our mouths. Problems with peripheral vision – seeing people and objects "out of the corner of the eye" – can reduce peak performance. During reading, children with poor visual tracking lose their place, confuse one word with another, make careless errors, and have difficulty breaking words into their parts. Prediction plays a significant role in reading, and peripheral vision greatly influences prediction.

VISUAL MEMORY

This is the ability to recall learned facts. A child with poor visual memory will have difficulty remembering material that was visually presented to him. The same child, however, might be able to recall the same information that was verbally read to him.

CONVERGENCE INSUFFICIENCY

In a study published in 2005 in the

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medical journal, *Strabismus*, David Granet, a paediatric ophthalmologist at the University of California in San Diego, said that children with the vision problem known as Convergence Insufficiency (CI) are three times more likely to be diagnosed with ADHD than children without the disorder.

Convergence Insufficiency is a common eve muscle coordination problem. When doing close work, a person's eye must turn in (converge) for the words to appear single. This usually happens without thinking. In CI, the eyes do not turn in as easily and as a result extra convergence effort must be used to force the eyes in. This additional effort can cause a number of symptoms such as eye strain, headaches, blurred vision, double vision, difficulty concentrating, loss of place and concentration as well as reading slowly. CI has no obvious signs and is only detected through a comprehensive visual examination evaluating all the critical visual skills discussed above.

Virtually all people who have Convergence Insufficiency (CI) have 20/20 vision. However it is not enough to have 20/20 vision and be able to see clearly. For the visual system to function properly, we must use both our eyes together in a very precise and coordinated fashion. This ability is the 'binocular vision' mentioned previously.

Every time we look at something we must accurately aim the two eyes directly at the object of interest. Each eye sends an image to the part of the brain that is involved in the process of seeing. This part of the brain called the visual cortex, then attempts to combine these two images to form one 'fused' image. If these images are identical, the result is normal, clear, single vision with a perception of depth. If however, if the two eyes are not performing in a coordinated manner, the visual cortex will receive two different images and will experience double vision.

There are many types of eye teaming or binocular vision problems. The eyes may tend to drift in, out, up, down, or a combination of these variations. The most common eye teaming problem is convergence insufficiency, in which the



eyes tend to drift outward when reading or engaged in any near visual activity.

Data gathered recently by The Convergence Insufficiency Treatment Trail Investigator Group in a series of studies, showed that performance-based symptoms, loss of concentration, rereading the same line, reading slowly, trouble remembering what was read or feeling sleepy occurred more frequently than eye-related symptoms i.e. blur, headache, diplopia (double vision) or astenopia (eye fatigue).

This potential link between Convergence Insufficiency and attention disorders has practical implications for educators, physicians, psychologists and other professionals involved in the detection, diagnosis and treatment of attention deficit hyperactivity disorder.

Since a child's vision is similar to adults by the age of 3, the American Optometric Association recommends a comprehensive eye test on an infant before one year of age. Further, in the United States, comprehensive visual examinations assessing all the critical visual skills required to read and learn are mandatory prior to a child starting Grade 1. This comprehensive visual evaluation should take at least 90 minutes.

A TAKE HOME MESSAGE FOR PARENTS

Convergence Insufficiency (CI) is a common vision problem in school age

children. Children with this problem may experience numerous symptoms that would make it more difficult to read and learn.

Research has shown that office-based vision therapy by a Developmental Behavioural Optometrist can effectively treat the condition, with most patients learning to control their muscles and overcome the disorder in 6 - 8 months.

RED FLAGS FOR ALL PARENTS

The 5 most common signs that a vision problem may be interfering with your child's ability to read and learn are:

- 1) Skips lines, rereads lines
- 2) Poor reading comprehension
- Homework takes much longer than it should
- 4) Reverses letters like 'b' and 'd'
- 5) Short attention span with reading and schoolwork.

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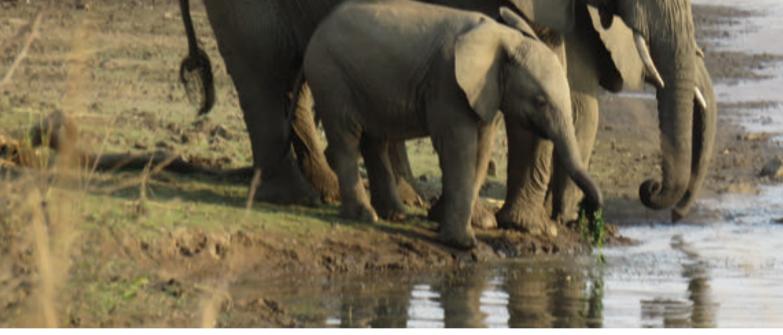
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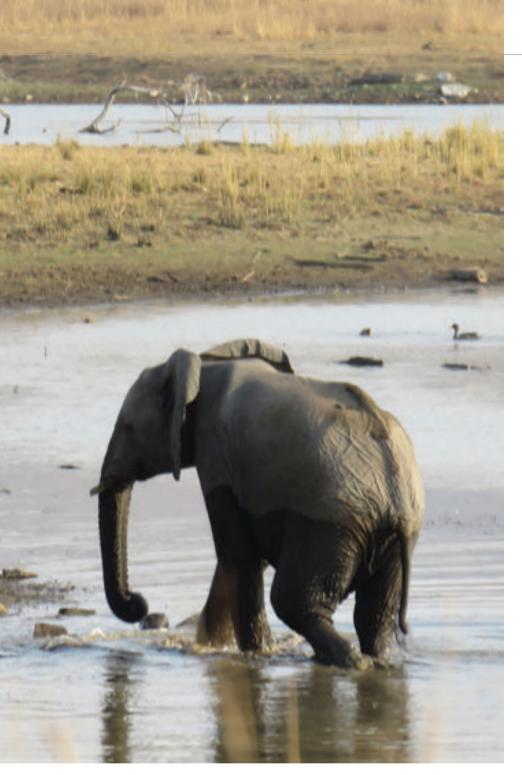
ELEPHANTS ARE JUST LIKE US



Humans, as much as elephants, love socialising before reverting back to family life.

Elephants have been around in their present interesting shape for more or less 20 million years. They have adapted to living in deserts, in canopy jungle, in savannahs and in mountains – just like us. here are so many other facets of the elephant's nature that can be described as being 'just like us', that it is quite uncanny - their family loyalty for a start, and their respect for social order. Calves stay close to their mothers for the first 10 years and all in the herd respect, with unswerving loyalty, the herd leader who is always an elderly female.

The matriarch forces out the males when they become mature. They will roam alone or with a male 'askari' forever, seeking receptive females. Isn't that reminiscent of some human cultures? There's a term for shared behavioural similarities - 'convergent evolution'. It describes how circumstances over thousands of generations can cause quite unrelated species to become similar in their way of life, their reactions and even their shape. Look at how the beautiful streamlining of sharks, which are fish, so closely resemble the streamlining and fins of dolphins, which are mammals. Each evolved separately but their adaptations converged - the shark evolved from a primitive fish more than 400 million years ago; the dolphin evolved from a four-legged, semi-aquatic land creature 50 million years ago.



The recent surge of interest in the character and behaviour of Africa's wild elephants owes a lot to the latterday influx of women into the science of animal behaviour (ethology). The recent discoveries by female ethologists have often been startling, even to scientists who are not easily startled.

Perhaps it's because women scientists are not quite as nervous as their male counterparts about anthropomorphising – that is attributing human behaviour to animals. Jane Goodall upset her Cambridge mentors by giving names to her wild chimpanzee study group in Tanzania's Gombe forest - remember the big male chimp, David Greybeard? She had been told to assign them only numbers.

And, I suggest, women are more empathetic by nature and so they are more able to tune into and intuitively understand animal behaviour, especially when it comes to mothers and families.

Two generations of dedicated and intrepid women field-biologists like Goodall, have been responsible for a watershed in the pace and direction of research. They popularised behavioural research without affecting the dignity of science.

It began with Goodall, who came from London to Africa in the late 1950s as a secretary to Louis Leakey, the Kenyan anthropologist. He recognised her unusual ability to observe wild animal behaviour with intelligence and analytical skill - she was a born ethologist. In 1971, a decade after becoming a scientist, she wrote her bestseller, In the Shadow of Man. It gave the world its first glimpse into the private lives of an animal few people had known outside zoos. Then it was Dian Fossey, another Cambridge PhD who lived with and wrote about mountain gorillas and paid for it with her life - murdered by a poacher.

In the 1980s, Cornell PhD, Katy Payne, discovered how wild elephants kept in touch with each other via aerial vibrations even when out of sight. Then came Joyce Poole, another Cambridge PhD who made even more inroads into the private lives of elephants.

An observation by an American expert on insects, Caitlin O'Connoll, a PhD from Hawaii, who just happened to be visiting Africa, astonished everybody. She was watching a passing herd of elephants and noticed one stop dead in mid stride "as if it had heard something". She could sense it was listening intently, but for what? Being an entomologist, she recalled seeing insects freeze in similar fashion after picking up the vibrations of potential partners (through their legs) and homing in on them to mate.

It transpired that the elephant was, in fact, "listening" to vibrations through the soles of its feet. An elephant's cushioned feet have cartilaginous nodes directly above the soles capable of picking up waveforms passing through rock and soil. The nodes are of similar fatty material whales and dolphins have in front of their skulls which picks up underwater seismic waves emitted by others. Dolphins and elephants, how far apart can one get? It's another instance of convergent evolution.

Nearly all mammals, at birth, have a brain size roughly 90 percent of the

weight of the adult brain. Their survival is based largely on instinct not on learning (brain work). In stark contrast, human babies are, uniquely, born with a brain only a quarter of adult size (28%) and elephant babies with not much more (35%).

Humans and elephants are helpless at birth and have to learn from their mothers how to survive. Both of us remain vulnerable throughout our long childhood and so our brains constantly develop and expand as we mature. For the first 10 or so years, elephant babies never move far from their mothers or from the extended family comprising aunts and grannies. All members of an elephant herd show a responsibility for the young regardless of whose young they are.

Elephant herds are always led by females, usually the oldest. The families may, on occasion, coalesce into bond groups but when they split up and reform back into family groups, they continue to stay in touch. We use technology - elephants use infrasound - sound waves too low in frequency for the human ear but capable of being heard by elephants far afield and which can then be relayed to more distant groups.

Most if not all field biologists remark how elephants, when not being persecuted by poachers and by 'sportsmen', are the most social, family-conscious, altruistic and friendly of all creatures. It is the family discipline within elephant society that most impresses, and the admirable, selfless behaviour of mothers.

The field biologists working in Africa are, without exception, impressed by the degree of cooperation within the herds and the way mothers and their offspring stay together in tightlyknit groups. When danger threatens, the females immediately form circles around the young.

Joyce Poole provided compelling evidence of the way elephants use role models in calf development and how important, in elephant society, the attitude of its individuals is towards the upbringing and discipline of the young. She found mothers even teach their daughters appropriate courtship behaviour and observed how, when an older bull approaches a young female, the relatives stay close.

Mating, after all, can be fraught considering the tonnage involved and how time is of the essence because females are in oestrus for only three days a year. It has recently been discovered that receptive females emit a unique infrasonic sound that attracts lone males from many kilometres away. As Poole wrote, "Being part of an elephant family is all about unity and working together for the greater good."

Elephants use vocal sounds, infrasounds through the air, and seismics by stomping; they scream, they trumpet, they chirp, they signal via smelly chemical secretions; they use body language quite as much as we do with our nods and waves and they touch each other just as we do when we tap somebody on the shoulder or give them a playful nudge in the ribs.

Sadly, it is only now, since we've shot the hell out of them, that we are beginning to realise how close we are how very close - and how much we owe them in the way of apologies.



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CATS VS. DOGS Throwing the Cat amongst the Pomeranians...

It's been said that the only thing Dog People and Cat People can agree on is that Bird People are the craziest... But seriously, while some may staunchly favour one type of pet over the other, most pet-lovers are what a well-known US behaviourist calls 'bi-pet-ual', and have a mixed fur family.

n the majority of cases, depending on how well you understand each species and set up a safe and comfortable environment for each, things will run smoothly and your dogs and cats will co-habit in a tolerant, if not completely adoring, relationship. The pointers here should highlight some key areas where cats and dogs differ, and help you to achieve a harmonious canine-feline balance in your home.

HUMAN INTERACTION

It is generally accepted amongst behaviourists that. while humans domesticated the dog, cats domesticated themselves. Dogs are pack animals and relish interaction, if not with each other. then with their human 'pack members'. Cats are solitary hunters, so they prefer to seek out company (whether human, or that of other family pets) on their own terms. They enjoy their privacy and independence and do not crave company, as their canine brothers and sisters do. While dogs are pretty much always ready for activity or affection, cats like to initiate these with us when they are 'in the mood'. Cats are wellknown for hopping straight onto the lap of the guest who professes not to like cats, or who is allergic. In fact, probably the best way to engage a cat's attention

and interest is to play hard to get! Cats can be taught appropriate behaviour, like staying off counters, but you'll need to accept that they will never live to please you, like dogs do.

For the most part, cats avoid the roughand-tumble type of play favoured by dogs, and appreciate being approached with a degree of calm and composure. It might help to visualise your dog as a varsity student, and your cat as an opinionated 40-something. The former sees every event from breakfast to a walk in the park as a party situation; the latter, you can discuss your politics and spiritual views with.

PREY OR PLAY? SAFETY FIRST!

Given that cats are generally much smaller than dogs (unless you are owned by a Maine Coon and a Chihuahua combination), it is vital to a cat's safety in the home that all dogs are taught, from Day 1, to respect

their feline siblings. There will always be exceptions, but it is ill-advised to bring cats into a home of dogs with a fighting breed background (Pit Bulls, Bull Terriers, Staffies), dogs that were bred to hunt small live prey (Dachsies, Whippets, Greyhounds) or members of the Terrier group. These dogs were originally bred to kill animals that look and behave a lot like cats, and there will always be a natural born instinct in them to chase or attack cats, especially if they try to flee. Horror stories abound of happy family pets who seemed to get on really well ending up attacking each other following a trigger-event of some sort. It's just not worth the risk. It is always preferable to introduce a new

puppy to an existing family of cats, where he can learn 'cat manners' along with all the other social skills he must master when he joins the family. If you plan on adopting a rescue dog, ensure that he has been socialised with cats and that his behaviour around cats (and other dogs) has been assessed, or you may have either an assembly of fuming felines, or a potentially life-threatening situation on your hands.

When bringing kittens into a home with dogs, even if the dogs have grown up with cats – ensure that any interaction between the species is supervised initially (until the kittens are at least 16 - 20 weeks of age and stronger and quicker, to get themselves to safety if need be). Lock them safely in a room by themselves when the humans are out.

Observe your dog's behaviour and learn to identify when it's play and when it's prey. Canine body-language indicates when he wants to stalk/hunt: dropping down through the shoulders, fixating his stare on the cat, furrowing brow,



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stiffness in the body. It's vitally important that your dog understands and has mastered the 'LEAVE!' command, as this will enable you to stop any undesirable behaviour immediately. Remember to always reward your dog for obeying your instruction with a yummy food treat, big cuddle or vocal praise.

You'll also want to learn to tell when your cat is stressed, eg. avoiding being in the room when another pet is occupying the space, urine marking, hiding/cowering, etc. It goes without saying that young children also need to be taught to interact gently with all pets, and to initiate play with dogs and cats differently, according to their individual preferences.

INTROVERTS AND EXTROVERTS

Cats are private creatures and ensuring their comfort in a multi-pet household involves paying specific attention to a few basic requirements. Litter trays need to be placed in areas where a cat can conduct his or her toilette away from the traffic of other pets and family members. A hooded litter tray with carbon filter for odour management may be just the ticket - visit Twisted Whiskers to see what's on offer. Remember the 1 + 1 rule: one litter tray per cat in the household (unless they have free access to the outdoors), and there should be one extra available. Feeding stations and sleeping areas should also be 'far from the madding crowd'.

Many cat breeds have evolved from being tree-dwellers and consequently enjoy aerial entertainment. Providing them with wall shelving or cat trees helps reduce anxiety, especially that caused by overbearing doggy friends. (Ask TW staff about custom-built cat trees to suit every home and budget.)

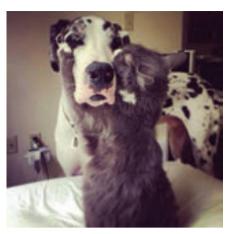
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Dogs, on the other hand, thrive on exercise as a means of keeping in touch with the outside world and burning off excess stress and energy. They are true socialites and value any opportunity to interact with their family and extended pack at the local dog park. Factor in plenty of 'team activities' for them like Doggy Day Care, puppy socialisation or obedience classes, charity dog walks, etc. Your dog's calendar should be busier than yours!

FEEDING HABITS

If you've previously been owned either by cats or by dogs, choosing a bi-petual lifestyle may take some adjusting to. For starters, cats are 'grazers', preferring to snack on small meals throughout the day. It is therefore completely acceptable to leave food down for them so that they can eat ad lib. Twice daily feeding works well for dogs, who flourish in a structured environment. Taking up his bowl 5-10 minutes after he has walked away from it, regardless of whether or not the food has been eaten, helps reinforce for your dog the concept that he depends on you, his Top Dog, for food, rather than being allowed to 'feed himself' throughout the



day, as he pleases, if the bowl is left down. If your dog has a clear understanding of this vital principle, it can go a long way towards avoiding issues like anxiety and aggression resulting from him feeling superior to the human pack and therefore responsible for their well-being - and consequently being resistant to having boundaries placed on his behaviour.

Cat food is higher in both protein and fat than dog food, making it practically irresistible to most canine palates. Added to this, dogs tend to be of the opinion that what's in anyone else's bowl is way more exciting than what's in theirs... Food left at ground level for the cats in a multi-pet family is therefore at grave risk of being vacuumed by the dogs at the first opportunity. Dogs can be trained to 'LEAVE!' the cat food, but it's safer to place cat food on a counter, out of reach of curious snouts. The kitties will thank you for the opportunity to be able to dine in peace and the dogs will retain their lean physiques.

Cats remain hunters at heart, regardless of how regularly we provide them with





yummy meals out of a pack or tin. It's only a matter of time before your cute little ball of candy-floss presents you with a freshly-dismembered bird. Or a Parktown prawn, valiantly clinging to its last shred of mortality. These are often artfully displayed on your pillow, or tucked lovingly into one of your favourite slippers. Try to avoid the urge to part company with your breakfast and/or to cart the cadaver off smartly in the direction of the nearest bin - for the uninitiated, the polite response is to praise your kitty for being such an amazing hunter. Fake it 'til you make it!

THE JOYS OF BEING BI

Now that we've looked at the amber lights, let's consider some of the fantastic things about being bi-pet-ual:

 Enjoy the adoring, unconditional love from your dogs, as well as that special



sense of pride that can only come from knowing that you've been 'chosen' by your cat.

- Relish all the exciting adventures you have with your dog, and then retreat into the tranquil 'sacred space' provided by stroking a purring cat on your lap.
- Appreciate your dog's clowning and your cat's elegant composure.
- Prepare to be amazed at how deep a bond both your dog and your cat can build with you expressed in completely different ways.
- Embark on an intellectual journey with your pets as you observe how the inherent traits of canines (pack animals) and felines (solitary hunters) play out in a domestic situation and how well developed they are for these roles, as well as the special and sometimes unique characteristics exhibited by the various breeds of dogs and cats.

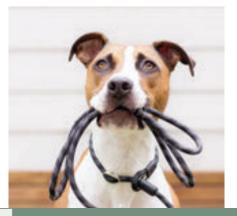

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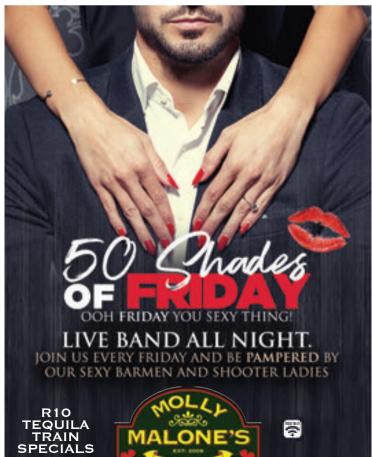

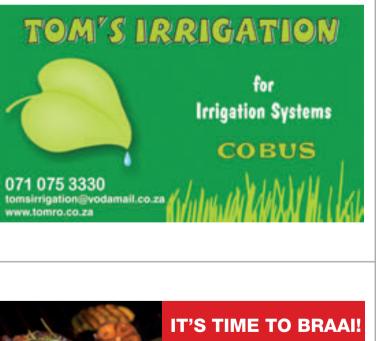

Now that London has enhanced its War Rooms underneath Whitehall from where Britain conducted World War 2 – the war that began 80 years ago – there is a resurgence of interest in that war.

Even in the sleepy Cotswolds where I was not long ago, I came across a tiny museum filled with memorabilia of the war years including - to my joy - a handful of metal studs called Segs. Now Segs will mean nothing to most readers, but to me - I was a small child when the Germans were redesigning British cities by dropping bombs on them - the sight of those studs released a cascade of memories.

We had moved out of London where I was born, to live in the Warwickshire countryside where the bombs were being dropped in a less concentrated manner. But life was frugal. No liquorice all sorts and we had to eat ox hearts and bowels because (mother said) the kids in China were starving. I have never quite worked out how this helped the kids in China.

But there was in the UK a shortage of almost everything - including cows and this meant a shortage of leather. Because leather was almost unobtainable, our shoes had to be made from imitation stuff, but the soles were of real leather. To make them last as long as possible my father hammered into them these heavy metal studs.

Like Cinderella, I had two ugly sisters who, despite their tearful objections, had to wear Segs in their shoes. When we three walked down our road to the village we sounded like the Brigade of Guards. Dull red sparks flew from our feet sometimes setting light to hayfields.

Walking on Segs was fun for me - a bit like wearing roller skates because they elevated one some distance above the ground. For years I never knew what it was to walk at ground level and it was only after the war, when the cows came home and Segs were no longer necessary, that I discovered I was quite a short little fellow.

A few years after the war our biology mistress announced the time had come

to teach us about sexual reproduction. She was very embarrassed, and she coyly asked if any of us knew anything about sex. She was hoping, I suppose, that we would all nod enthusiastically and she could then skip the subject and get on with the respiratory system.

Nobody reacted, except me. Having very narrow ear channels I thought she was asking if any of us knew about Segs and that she wanted to reminisce about those dark war days.

My hand shot up. She was surprised. Everybody was.

She bade me take the floor and I told the class how Segs made you feel tall and how really good Segs caused sparks to fly and set light to hayfields. Noticing the way the biology teacher's eyes shot open I warmed to the subject and told the class that my father claimed the more Segs you had the longer your shoe leather lasted.

I was about to tell her how the cobbler's wife down in the village, Mrs Deeming, would give us boys free Segs - but she motioned me to sit down and we all had to take out our text books and turn to page 147 and read (quietly to ourselves) about the reproductive habits of the common newt.

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
