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INTRUDER ALARMS


Many changes have taken since the time when the first burglar alarm was made in 1858. To many South African households, burglar alarms or intruder detection alarms are now an integral part of their daily routines. A misconception prevails in Fourways Gardens though in as much as some residents don't believe they need intruder detection alarms. Whilst the FWG Guard Force does its utmost to keep the bad guys out of the Estate, we have to rely on residents to ensure they don't invite the criminals to their houses. The intruder alarm is an invaluable tool to assist residents safeguard themselves from undesirable elements entering their homes. Technology in the intruder detection alarms industry has advanced so that the old days of having to punch in the code on the keypad is no longer necessary. The ease of use astounds many people not familiar with alarms. Once installed, though, the alarm system is only any good when it is used and maintained. Here are a few Intruder Detection Alarm tips to remember:

- Don't be the "boy who cried wolf".

Persistent false alarms irritate neighbours and lead to a false sense of urgency. If there is something wrong with the alarm have it fixed as a matter of high importance.

- Test your alarm on a monthly basis. It's as easy as phoning the control room and telling them that you want to test your alarm. The controllers will help you from there.
- Make sure the alarm is plugged into the wall and is turned on. Most transformers (the big box attached to the wall near the plug) have an LED which is lit when the alarm is provided power from the mains.
- Have a technician service the alarm about once a year. He will clean out the detectors, make sure the wiring is still good, check the battery and change it if required and ensure the general good health of your device.
- Make sure you and only those you want have access to activate and deactivate your alarm.

Become aware of surroundings, connection of groundedness on your mat, begin to surrender the feeling of resistance in certain parts of the body. Let your gentle breath be your teacher, the mind tends to become more interested on what is happening in the body.

Practise for myself and others are gentle, profound, connective and integrative. Yoga has been gaining immense popularity due to short term as well as long term benefits that it provides. The aims of yoga enthusiasts are extremely varied. Some are particularly inspired by the spiritual and relaxing element that yoga provides, others by the increased fitness and flexibility that it results in. Some people find solutions to suffering from varied health disorders and there are others who achieve an all-round development of a calm, stress free mind and a fit body.

It has been the subject of research for the past few decades for therapeutic purposes for modern epidemic diseases like mental stress, obesity, diabetes, hypertension, and chronic disease.

Yoga in fact means "Union" of individual consciousness with the supreme consciousness. The goal of yoga shows that it is a holistic way of life, leading to a state of complete physical,



social, mental, spiritual well-being and harmony with nature. Yoga is effective in prevention as well as management of stress and stress induced disorders.

Training of yoga asanas (poses) and pranayama (breath-work) for a few months, 1 hr everyday can develop a sense of well-being. There are many types of yoga, Hatha yoga

is combination of many styles and one of the most popular styles that I teach.

WATER: OUR MOST VALUABLE UNDERVALUED RESOURCE

TALK BY DAMIAN BOOTH TO THE GARDENING CLUB OF FOURWAYS GARDENS, JUNE 8TH MEETING 2017.

Benjamin Franklin said,

“When the well’s dry, we know the worth of water.”

AMANZI4SURE is owned and run by Fourways Gardens resident Damian Booth and provides municipal water backups, water harvesting and drinking water filtration systems.

Water is scarce and water prices are going to escalate in coming years. The consistent, mostly reliable supply of water in our area is at risk due to the increasing developments in Northern Johannesburg and lack of services upgrade to keep pace. This includes the massive mall development happening in Fourways.

Compared to the rest of the world, our water tariffs in South Africa are low and water is a significantly undervalued resource. Business tenants are now insisting on standby generators and municipal water backups as a prerequisite for rental agreements. This is also starting to be a trend in residential letting for expats.

So what are our options to ensure a secure consistent supply of fresh safe water?

- Grey water is an option but a challenge as untreated grey water contains chemicals and bacteria and cannot be stored for longer than 24 hours. The water can only be used for irrigation and it needs heavy treatment.
- Borehole water is an option. If you’re fortunate enough to drill successfully, the quality of the water needs to be tested and usually treated to make it suitable for drinking and other household use. Drilling, testing and

filtration can be costly. Most Fourways Gardens boreholes hit water at 40 – 60 metres and achieve yield of between 500 - 2500 litres/hour. A yield of less than 250 – 300 litres/hour is not financially viable.

- Rainwater harvesting is a “green” way to go and will ensure you have stored water in the rainy season. Rainwater can be used to water the garden and top up the pool.
- Installing a municipal water backup is a sure way of securing your drinking and household water supply for interruptions in the municipal water supply.
- Filtration of drinking water due to the decreasing quality of the municipal supply. AMANZI4SURE supplies residents with options of filtering the municipal water for the entire house or only selected taps used for drinking water.

After assessing the various options, the most popular way residents and businesses go is either a Municipal Water Backup or a Borehole, the latter being the significantly more expensive option.

AMANZI4SURE specialises in Municipal Water Backups, the most popular being 2500 or 5000 litre storage tanks, which will last between 2 and 5 days for an average household, depending on how responsible the water usage is. The system works on water pressure as the trigger of the backup to start feeding the house with water. As soon as the municipal water pressure drops below a certain level, when a tap is turned on in the house, the backup pump kicks in and pumps water from the JoJo tank into the house. It is recommended to run the backup once a week for a short period to ensure the water circulates and remains fresh. Designing the backup system for each residence is different and depends on where the water enters the property, location of

underground pipes, paving, and so on. AMANZI4SURE only uses quality parts on their installations, ensuring the longevity of the installation.

Tips for choosing an installer:

- Ensure the installer uses quality plumbing materials.
- Don’t go with an installer who quotes you without a site visit. The foundation for a successful installation is a good customer specific design, which cannot be done without a site visit.
- Don’t go with an installer who does this as one of the things they do. Select one that specialises in municipal backups to get the best results.
- Beware of the cheapest quote. Repair costs on botched jobs by fly-by-night installers cost the customer more in the long run.
- Once you have short listed the suppliers, invest some of your own valuable time and do at least one site visit of an installation that is at least 6 months old, preferably a year. That way you see how the workmanship stands the test of time.
- Ensure the tank is installed in a concrete plinth or similar flat surface – without this most tank warranties are invalid.
- Ensure a good quality, correctly spec’d pump is used – that’s usually the first thing to break (make sure you run it regularly if it’s not on a timer).
- Invest in the biggest tank you can afford and fit into the space you have available. The cost difference of a 2500 and 5000l is not much when you considered the entire installation.





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WINTER PRUNING TIPS

Trees & Shrubs

When it's cold outside it is easy to forget about our trees and shrubs outdoors. Winter is actually one of the better times of year to prune some of your deciduous plants. Pruning in general is important for many reasons. It helps to control the size of the plant, guide its growth, and encourage flowering and fruiting. It is a necessity to keep your trees and shrubs healthy by pruning out broken, diseased and dead branches.

Why prune in winter?

Pruning in the winter has its advantages. First, with the lack of leaves on the plant you can better determine where to make the proper cuts. The structure of the plant's branches is easier to see and easy to follow. The winter weather also provides the least amount of chance of diseases being transmitted from one plant to another.

Many deciduous, or broadleaved, trees and shrubs can be pruned in the winter while dormant. This will help prepare them for the upcoming spring season. It is important not to prune evergreens. It is typically recommended that they are pruned during their growth season.

What are the best practices?

When deciding which branches to prune, be sure to follow the natural lines of the plant. Cut off any dead or diseased branches first. If there are any unnatural-looking limbs that are sprouting from the base or at right angles to others these can also be removed. To promote air circulation, thin the canopy of trees out. Start at the centre and move to the exterior, thinning out the branches that make



up the densest part of your tree or shrub. When cutting, be sure to prune just above a bud.

Be sure to never remove more than one-fourth of the plant. Also avoid topping or cutting off the tops of your shrubs. Topping only encourages unmanageable growth. Another word of caution: if you are dealing with a large tree or your plant is close to power lines, it is best left to the professionals. (RealGreen is able to provide quotations for such instances.)

Rose Pruning

Pruning roses is intimidating to many gardeners, but actually very good for the plants. Becoming an accomplished rose pruner takes time and practice, but keep in mind that it is very hard to kill a rose with bad pruning.

Why prune your roses?

Encourage new growth and bloom
Remove dead wood
Improve air circulation
Shape the plant

When to prune your roses

Rose pruning is done during late winter. Throughout most of South Africa this should be left until late July and August. This is when the days start to get longer and temperatures start rising which leads to new growth and a great time to shape and prune your roses.

In areas which experience severe frost and cold nights its best to wait till late August and even early September. Pruning a bit late is always better than not pruning at all.

Remember pruning in early winter and late autumn could stimulate new growth before winter, resulting in cold damage.

Rose Pruning Basics

- Use clean, sharp tools.
- Look at the overall plant, but begin pruning from the base of the plant.
- Prune to open the centre of the plant to enhance light and air circulation.
- Make your cuts at a 45-degree angle, about 1/4 inch above a bud that is facing toward the outside of the plant.
- Make sure it is a clean cut, not ragged.
- Remove all broken, dead, dying or diseased wood (Any branches that look dry, shriveled or black. Cut until the inside of the cane is white.)
- Remove any weak or twiggy branches thinner than a pencil.
- Remove any remaining foliage.

So, even in the cold Winter months we can still enjoy gardening! It is generally agreed that most mistakes will grow out very quickly and it is better to make a good effort at pruning roses than to let them grow rampant.

In addition, there are eight craft beers on tap, and a comprehensive wine list, with

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

By the second week we had sold the usual 60 tickets but our restaurant, managed by Francois in his usual calm and controlled manner, told us he would be able to accommodate additional wine tasting enthusiasts. We eventually packed 90 guests into the hall who were treated to a wonderful evening of wine tasting, furthering their knowledge of Alvi's Drift wines and their champagne.

Junel treated us to a very interesting comparison of wines, tasting similar grape varieties that were either steel barrel or French oak barrel fermented. It was interesting to note the contrast of

the differing fermentation processes on the end product, and from the tastings, the French oak fermentation generally seemed to produce the preferred wine. She has a most wonderful way of presenting facts with a delightful sense of humour that keeps the audience enthralled.

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Oh, to be beside the seaside



James Clarke reviews two new guide books that add new dimensions to enjoying the outdoors.

Considering there are 13 000 species of coastal animals and marine plants along the South African coast there are surprisingly few guide books for those of us who are compulsive beachcombers. I don't know about you but when walking along the high tide mark I am constantly having to pick up things and examine them.

I find it frustrating not being able to identify what I am looking at.

While there are many current and comprehensive guide books to help us identify Southern Africa's 900 or so kinds of birds and several reference and field books for identifying our hundreds of species of mammals and reptiles, for the 13 000 species of creatures found along our coastline I know of only one useful broad scale reference book.

Yet look at the enormous variety of shells we have, let alone arthropods such as crabs and shrimps, and there's a whole range of jelly fish, starfish and all those fascinating little animals that play hide and seek in the tidal pools and the variety of other fish, seaweeds and sponges. Then there are the coastal birds and mammals such as dolphins and sea lions. And let's not forget the turtles that come ashore at night.


I recently mentioned the sheer joy of birding with an enthusiastic youngster but it is even more fun to stroll along a beach with inquisitive children or foreign visitors.

I must, therefore, doff a respectful hat to Struik Nature publishers (a division of Penguin/Random House) for coming out with an expanded edition of *Two Oceans – A guide to the marine life of southern Africa*.

Of necessity it is a thick book (464 pages) but still perfectly portable and reasonably priced too thanks to generous financial support from Nedbank's Green Trust, the World Wildlife Fund and dozens of generous individuals, and thanks too to the details added gratis by knowledgeable beachcombers.

This new edition illustrates far more species than the last, plus the text has been updated and so have the geographic distribution maps that cover the South African coast from Walvis Bay in the west to Inhambane in Mozambique to the east.

Southern Africa has 6% of the world's known coastal species and a third of them are unique to our region. Margaret Smith, when she headed the JLB Smith Institute of Ichthyological at Rhodes years ago, told me she received seven to eight new species a year – and that was just fish.



Two Oceans has several hundred colour photographs: 80 of crabs alone and hundreds of shell species. The book provides easily digestible details of creatures from whales to winkles. It even comes inshore to help identify organisms in the dune forests.

Two of the authors, George and Margo Branch, in 1981, with photographer, Anthony Bannister, produced *The Living Shores of Southern Africa* (Struik), a wonderful exposition of sea life. But it was no field guide.

Two Oceans, as a reference book and “field guide” is nothing short of spectacular and when I next go down to the sea I will make sure to pack it.

It’s a toss-up whether there is more variety of animal life along our shores than there is inland. Certainly there’s an equal amount of fascination. And thanks to nature programmes on television and the plethora of new and quite specialised wildlife books the public’s curiosity regarding nature is deepening and widening.

From the same stable as *Two Oceans* comes a new field guide: *Tracker Manual*. The 312-page book concentrates on animal spoor and droppings – including those of birds and reptiles. It’s a comprehensive work – encompassing the combined knowledge of Alex van den Heever, who founded and manages the South Africa College for Tourism’s Tracker Academy in Graaff-Reinet and his associates – two professional trackers. They are Karel Benadie, who after 33 years tracking in the Karoo National Park is now trainer at the academy, and Renias Mhlongo, a tracker in the Lowveld and an instructor with the tracking academy based at Londolozi.

Van den Heever has spent 20 years studying tracking and nowadays assesses trackers. He says the art is dying just when the popularity of wilderness trails is at an all-time high. Make no mistake “eco-tourists” pay big bucks (forgive the unintended pun) to stand around a deposit of fresh you-know-what and to study the surrounding spoor and feel the thrill of knowing a honey badger or even a lion had passed by.

Tracker Manual gives it to you in vivid colour photographs as well as drawings and generously detailed but tightly written text.

Blue wildebeest

Connochaetes taurinus



The blue wildebeest is also known as the "brindled gnu" due to the dark vertical bands over its shoulders, which give it a brindled hue. It has a beard of hair hanging from the throat and neck and a long black mane. Both sexes have horns that curve upwards and inwards. Newborns are light brown in colour. This antelope prefers open grassland. In many areas of the greater Kruger National Park local wildebeest populations have shrank dramatically as a result of fencing and artificial water holes, which have affected their traditional migratory behaviour.

Habits

- These gregarious herbivores occur in herds ranging from 10 to a few thousand.
- Most active during the day, they graze during the early morning and late afternoon.
- Resident herds with cows and calves move in home ranges close to permanent water.
- Pregnant cows move away from the herd to give birth. Newborn calves are able to move with their mother within half an hour of birth.
- Wildebeest will make an alarm call, a blowing grunt, for lions, leopards and wild dogs. It appears the alarm call produced for lions is more drawn-out than for other predators.

Feeding and diet

- The blue wildebeest prefers short grass and needs access to water.

Apart from 80 or so years' experience between the authors Benadie and Mhlongo inherited a wealth of knowledge passed down by their forebears to whom tracking was second nature.



Most of the academy's students are chosen from the jobless, nearly all of whom find jobs in game reserves after qualifying.

reserve and wildly guesses at the spoor or dung at the roadside, you'll be a great more accurate using this book. Even to the extent that you'll be able to tell which was the animal's front foot and which way it was going and even how fast and when.

It also serves the dual purpose of helping identify 160 animals – mainly mammals, from the pictures.

And, can you believe it, even how to spot where a butterfly took off? But that's for the matric class.

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The gift of gratitude

It took me a while, but I now understand the value and the positive returns of practising daily gratitude.

For many years I sailed through life in a generally unconscious fashion. I was, to a large extent, unaware of my relationship with, and my impact on, the universe as a whole. I was so completely centred around getting what I wanted out of life, that it simply never occurred to me, that how I engaged with everything and everyone around me, had a significant impact on the outcomes I was experiencing. I simply couldn't see that, assisted, by a choice not to.

I often wonder now, how many of us go through life with this ignorant blindness, and for how long?

But I got lucky, I guess.

Toward the end of my forties, life circumstances combined to create the perfect storm. Truly cataclysmic events started to rain down on me with more and more frequency. The consequences of which forced me into some radical, and urgent behavioural changes.

Through personal experiences, you most likely know, big behavioural change is exceptionally difficult, a lot of the time, most often it fails. For some, it often requires a dose of harsh reality before any meaningful motivation for shift occurs, that was I.

A note on behavioural change

It doesn't always have to be that way, what neuroscience now knows, is that the chance of establishing new habits, are greatly enhanced, when linked to an established positive habit - more on that another time.

Back to those colliding universal forces and the pride before the fall.

My ego had been so engulfed in self-directed will, for so long, that eventually there was the inevitable push back from the universe. The law of cause and effect finally made its presence known to me, and it wasn't gentle in its delivery. Some brutally harsh truths were administered. The impact of these caused a great many discomforts in my life, and as a consequence, motivated me to reach out for advice and help. Something that until that point was way beneath what my ego felt acceptable. Pride has many a nasty side affect.

So, I followed my intuition and sought help.

One of the first of many tools suggested was a gratitude diary.

On asking why, and how, this would be of help to me, it was explained, that because I had become so obsessed with myself, and a desire to manipulate the world, I had fixated on what was wrong about my life, and had completely neglected the positive aspects. I had too, built a belief that I could

somehow experience life as a constant stream of bliss and perfection.

My reply to the individual seeking to help me was...

"But what have I got to be grateful for?"

She was unemotional and practical in her response.

She asked me if I could see. She asked if I could use my hands. She told me to stand up, and let her know if I could walk.

With a crushed ego and a helping of humility – I understood her perspective, with clarity.

She then delivered the Coup de Gras...

"A gratitude diary will also take you out of your pointless self pity."

This really hurt, because I was feeling very sorry for myself. And of course that was her point.

So, I began to journal.

I started a reflecting and recording on what I had to be grateful for at the end of each day. To begin with I used those very obvious physical assets, my 'saviour' had pointed out. Then I began to expand on the growing list, to include a vast array of various links that I had simply never entertained before.

There were the people around me that had consistently offered positive support, all of which I had ignored, but through the lens of gratitude, I realised how genuinely caring and thoughtful they had been. Many of these people were the quieter, calmer ones that I had kept at the periphery of my world. They emerged as the really important and meaningful relationships in my life.

Then there were all the practical and material aspects of my life. The belongings that I had become so familiar with, that I had forgotten their actual value. I started seeing items I had taken for granted, in a completely new light. The smallest and simplest of objects suddenly took on great significance, and many of the things I had been pursuing with such abandoned lust, became meaningless. I had so much to be grateful for, I began feeling ashamed of what I had neglected for so long.

There were, as well, all those magnificent natural world moments. That in my self inflicted miserableness, I had switched off, as we would a TV.

The countless glorious daily sunsets from my window, which offered up such moments of mesmerising and colourful splendour, the trees that would sway in harmony with the wind, the building thunderstorms and with them, the breaking rain. Walks through dry bushveld, just after dawn, where

the birdcalls are the only thing that interrupts the silence, and just sitting in my garden, allowing my eyes to wander over what we had built over years of careful planning and hard work.

And my own various unique skills, experiences and talents, these too; I had devalued, ranked as somehow unimportant, unworthy of notice.

As my gratitude list grew and ever expanded, so too, did my levels of happiness, serenity and contentment. As had been promised by this saint of a woman at the start of my journey, I would come to see and experience, the very things I had taken for granted, as hugely important and valuable.

With each expression of gratitude, my self-worth grew as well. I became stronger and clearer, more open and balanced of view and opinion, less resentful of others and more willing to give of myself, without expectations in return.

My whole wellbeing improved, as did my view of the world.

I had ceased viewing the world from the perspective of... 'what's missing'... to one where I would instinctively respond with... thank you for that.

There is a well-known psychology test that I understand was first conducted with

American university students. It goes something like this...

The students were each given a twenty-dollar bill; they were then informed that they had a choice, of either spending the money on themselves, or gifting it to someone else, 90% chose to give it to another.

We know today, thank you neuroscience, that the reward system in our brain gets a chemical rush of dopamine when we provide someone else with a gift.

When we express gratitude on a regular basis, we receive the same sense of joy.

Long ago now, I gave up writing in the journal, I found that the routine and habit had successfully reprogrammed me, and that by default, I now function from a point of gratitude in just about everything I do.

So, if you don't already, begin today. Start showing gratitude in your life and the gifts will come to you.

Why Empathy Matters

Schools everywhere are continually dealing with issues around bullying. We also see a lack of manners and respect creeping in amongst our youth. There could be many reasons for this. They could range from a variety of difficulties at home, to lack of parental guidance, to an attempt by our children to empower themselves in an increasingly pressurised world.

In addition to this, one-on-one personal social engagement is decreasing with the rise in use of social media. As a result, we are increasingly disconnecting in connected world. It is also easier to hide behind screens and words, so maybe we say things we would never ordinarily have said.

How many of us have considered, fundamental to addressing these kinds of issues, the concept of empathy.

Empathy is defined as the ability to understand and share the feelings and emotions of other people. It therefore creates a link between ourselves and others, so that we may comprehend what it is they may be experiencing. It is also a vital element of emotional intelligence.

Sympathy vs Empathy

One may wonder how it differs from sympathy. Sympathy is perhaps best described as feeling something “for” someone; empathy is feeling “with” someone. When you sympathise with someone – you feel sorry for them. Empathy means truly understanding their struggle.

The Power of Empathy

In all the anti-bullying work Life Talk undertakes with schools, a very strong focus area for us is always friendship and caring for others – which translates into having empathy and compassion. We can't expect our children to stand up for the victims, or stand up to the bully, if they fundamentally don't actually care what is happening to those around them.

Caring is a skill we need to teach our children. Awareness of others is vital to the long-term success of any anti-bullying initiative and, we believe, impacts positively on manners and values too. We owe it to society as a whole to nurture empathy within our children.

Various research studies undertaken over the years show that when empathy is high, incidences of bullying, teasing and discrimination are lower. When children feel connected to each other in an environment, like a school, the incidences of negative behaviour dropped and in fact, their connectedness to their school increased.

Teaching Empathy

Just as we teach our children to talk and read, so we need to teach them social skills such as empathy. And the younger you start the better. That way it becomes a way of life and an instinctive behaviour, although it can be learnt later on as a skill. There are many suggestions of what we can do as parents – here are some of those:

- **Model empathy/ lead by example** – we often write about how children learn their most important behaviours and develop various social qualities by watching their parents. So, in all you interactions, in the presence of your children, try to show kindness, understanding, concern and respect – they are watching you and will most likely behave as you do. As a matter of fact, teachers or anyone working with children should be very aware of their responses – adult behaviours shape out children.

- **Teach inclusivity** – encourage your children, from a young age, to understand other people's viewpoints or perspective. Discuss with them what those individuals challenges may be, how they may be feeling, and how that could affect, hurt or shape them. Different viewpoints should be encouraged and embraced. 'It's not about you, it's about us', is a good motto to teach.
- **Circle of Concern** – this is a clever exercise whereby you can encourage a discussion on the topic of caring, or discrimination, stereotypes, envy, shame or any related topics – both in the home or at school. It's easy to be



- **Value and love your children** – Children who feel confident, valued and loved at home are generally more likely to treat others more kindly. They are less likely to feel the need to break others down in an attempt to seek attention and more likely to show compassion towards others.

So, empathy matters! Showing empathy can not only transform your own life, but also those of others. Empathy brings about positive social change. Without a doubt, a little empathy goes a long way towards creating a more peaceful world to be in. In the words of Henry David Thoreau: "Could a greater miracle take place than for us to look through each other's eyes for an instant".

more empathetic towards people you care about such as your family and best friends, but this exercise teaches you to look beyond that inner circle.

- **Teach active listening** – too often we formulate opinions before someone has even spoken or before they are done talking. Teach children to focus on the person talking and truly listen to what they have to say. Then, to think about what the person said. It may change their initial views.
- **Be happy and positive** – being happy and having a positive outlook on life, goes a long way. Encourage your children to surround themselves with good friends who bring positive energy

and fun into their lives. Not only will it build empathy but also self-esteem and general happiness. It's always easier to be nice to someone when you are in a good mood or a positive frame of mind!

- **Apologise** – if you have made a mistake or been unkind, you have to be able to do the right thing and apologise. But, you have to really mean it otherwise it is really meaningless. Teach your children to put themselves in that person's shoes and to think about the situation, how they would feel and what they would like to have happen if it were them in that situation. It could change their outlook completely.


June. The middle of the year. How has it come so quickly?


7 of the strangest hotels in existence today:

And an unnamed South African paper reported: "The concert held at the Good Templers' Hall was a great success... Special thanks were due to the minister's daughter who laboured the whole evening at the piano which, as usual, fell upon her."

But, as I say, the internet is much more exciting.

It reported that the average cost of rehabilitating a seal after the Exxon Valdez Oil spill in Alaska was \$80 000. At a special ceremony, two of the saved animals were being released amid cheers and applause from onlookers. A minute later, in full view, a killer whale ate them both. Sometimes the report says it was otters that were released and then eaten.

Whatever. There's not an ounce of truth in the story but it became terribly popular.

And how about this one?

A woman came home to find her husband in the kitchen shaking frantically, almost in a dancing frenzy, with some kind of wire running from his waist towards the electric kettle. Intending to jolt him away from the deadly current, she ran outside and grabbed a handy plank of wood and smacked him with it, breaking his arm in two places. Up to that moment, he had been happily listening to his iPod through his earphones.

This wasn't true either.

There's this from Germany: Two animal rights defenders were protesting the cruelty of sending pigs to a slaughterhouse in Bonn, Germany.

Suddenly, all 2 000 pigs broke loose and escaped through a broken fence, stampeding madly. The two helpless protesters were trampled to death.

Total fiction. But it keeps cropping up.

And this one:

An Iraqi terrorist, Khay Rahnajet, didn't pay enough postage on a letter bomb. It came back with "Return to Sender" stamped on it. Forgetting it was the bomb, he opened it and was blown to bits.

Again, not an atom of truth. But what a pity.

But the following stories which appeared in various newspapers can be totally relied upon. Trust me. I'm a newspaperman.

Zoologists can only visit the hot springs in El Hamma with the permission of the local Kaliphat and with an escort of police, since it is reserved for the exclusive use of Muslim women bathers. 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

The Friends of Rescued Animals (Fora) shelter was founded in 2003 by Marlene de Beer, a soft-hearted woman who couldn't just ignore the plight of the thousands of animals without food, shelter and basic veterinary care.

Fora is a pro-quality shelter. In other words, from a health aspect the management ensures that the animals are sterilized, vaccinated, sufficiently dewormed and parasite free. The dogs have to be exercised and all the animals are fed a reasonably quality food.

And it doesn't stop there. The animals also have to be in a good state of health and mind. Fora tries to create as happy an environment as they possibly can, but unfortunately no shelter is a happy ever after. It should be a stepping stone to a new ever after home.

The animals that land up at a shelter are the lucky ones, but often the animals pine for their ex-owners, become stressed and refuse food.

Shelter Manager, Linda Scrace, who joined Fora three-and-a-half years ago, says they have to turn animals away every day because the facilities are full. Overcrowding causes behaviour and social issues and depletes the quality of life of the existing dogs. They have

350 dogs and 150 cats that they are desperate to find homes for.

The main problem that contributes to the high numbers of animals in shelters worldwide is irresponsible animal ownership: not sterilizing pets creates huge numbers of unwanted animals, therefore unnecessary suffering.

Don't hesitate to adopt! Excellent decision! BUT... please take your time, do your homework; have realistic expectations and find the right fit for your lifestyle, surroundings and resident animals you may have. This is imperative for a successful outcome.



Essentially, when bringing an adopted dog home, we are arranging a marriage. A dog's personality and prior learning experiences are going to be a deciding factor for a good match, not what the dog looks like.

Dogs are highly adaptable, and then there are those who lack basic coping skills; have brittle personalities and have not been taught with kind methods how to behave in a domestic environment. They are relying on you to guide them and teach them. Time, patience and educated guidance will assist in a happy union.

If you have resident dogs, ask the shelter if you can arrange a meet and greet. We can't force dogs to get on together if they are just not into each other.

Your resident dog and other animals in your home have a say in the decision too. Remember, a dog in a shelter often behaves completely differently when it gets to your home and settles in. So although a first meeting is very important, much can change thereafter. Be prepared that your expectations may require a complete turnaround.

Important factors to consider: Size of dog for your home environment; energy levels; mental and physical needs; puppy or adult; breed specific tendencies; socialability of the adopted dog as well as resident dogs/other species; can you care for the new dog financially? Are all family members in agreement? Age of children in the home; have they been taught how to respectfully interact with a canine companion; are they old

enough to understand when interaction is not appropriate? Is your household sedentary; active; a hive of activity and noise or is it very quiet? How much time will you have for your new dog?

If you have concerns; questions; or just need to bounce ideas off a professional don't hesitate. The more we can help all new owners by being there for them when they need correct educational advice, the more dogs will remain in homes and won't be returned to shelters. It would be well worth your while to contact a behavioural professional prior to making the final choice.

Investing time and effort in searching for the best fit will pay off in dividends for many years to come, turning the new relationship into a life-long friendship.

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
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
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
