Dear Residents

I have taken the opportunity of highlighting two important Estate issues. The first one being a domestic worker security issue, and the second, being a thank you to all those residents who acknowledge and respect the Estate Rules.

DOMESTIC WORKERS

Do you have household staff who are no longer employed by you?

If you no longer make use of the services of your employees, (household staff and gardeners), we request that you inform the HOA administration office, so that our access control database can be updated. This ensures that all employees enrolled on our database are valid, and prevents your exemployees from gaining access to the Estate via their fingerprints, if they are no longer employed by you.

There are residents who have employed domestic workers and gardeners that are not enrolled on our biometric system. We kindly request that residents make provision for the enrolment of their employees as soon as possible.

Residents can either make an appointment with Margaret Nhlapo, the Access Control clerk, or pop in with their domestic worker/s to the HOA offices. Office hours are: Mondays to Fridays from 08:00 to 16:00.



The temporary shelter for survivors of rape and domestic violence in Diepsloot needs your help.

ur Charity Club recently asked residents to please donate clothing for the chosen charity, Green Door, operating in Dieplsloot. The Fourways Gardens residents did not disappoint and bags of good quality clothing for men, women and children were dropped off at the HOA offices. The items were neatly sorted by the ladies of the FWG Charity Club, and a delivery date was agreed on.

On 16 May 2019, I had the privilege of escorting Annie and Sheila to Green Door to deliver the items that were donated. When we arrived, we were met by Brown Lekekela, the founder of Green Door. This man's modesty, determination and compassion shone through every word he spoke! It was a truly humbling experience to meet a person with such drive. I asked him to please write a little bit of his history, and why he felt the need to open the shelter. His explanation sent shivers down my spine and made me realise just how lucky many of us are, to live the lives we do.

Dear Elmine, Annie and Sheila,

Thank you guys for the visit today at Green Door and for the generous donation of clothing and shoes from the residents of Fourways Gardens Estate.

Green Door is a temporary shelter for survivors of rape and domestic violence.



I am the founder of Green Door otherwise known as a 'door of hope' and I was the only victims centre counsellor at Diepsloot Police Station from 2011 to 2013.

While I was volunteering at victim centre at the police station, there were cases of domestic violence that were not reported to the police because police station are too far from the community and some victims have little faith in the police. Some women we found, were raped and some died along the way to report such cases, as most of them happened during the night and usually around pay-day.

It got me wondering, how many women and children die and are abused by their partners and nothing is done.

Green Door was launched during the 16 day of activism on 24 Nov 2013 and was later registered as an NPO (Diepsloot Victim Lifeline).

It is a temporary shelter for survivors of rape and domestic violence.

We offer psycho-social support to the victim

We offer them shelter to sleep

We help them to open a case

We call the police

We refer them to other professionals (doctors, social workers, lawyers etc.) We give them food, clothing and toiletries.

I do home visits to check on our clients and we do school talks, workshops in our community.

I have one functioning bedroom and two more rooms have just been built with no furniture. My aim is to build 15 more bedrooms to at least accommodate 15 to 20 families, each room will cost R15 000 to build.

It will help a lot to have permanent shelter in Diepsloot as it will help more women and children who are staying in a toxic environment just because they have nowhere to go.

As a NPO we don't have funding, we survive by the individual donations.

We need financial support

We need non-perishable food

We need toiletries

We need cleaning materials

We need secondary clothing

Our biggest need is to build 15 more rooms to help more people! If anyone can assist.

GROWING GLORIOUS ALOES

alcolm from WILDFLOWER NURSERY of Witkoppen Road came to share with us the celebration of the May Festival of Early Flowering Aloes which ran from 17 to 26 May 2019. A second festival, The Big Aloe Festival, will run from 19 July to 4 August 2019. The venue for these gatherings is the Witkoppen Wildflower Nursery which, at 60 years, is the oldest indigenous nursery in SA!

There are many indigenous species that can be grown in your garden, but the Aloe festivals celebrate the wonderful varieties developed by Sunbird Aloes. These Aloes are selected for their muchimproved flowers and flowering abilities. The plants themselves are strong and attractively shaped.

THE BENEFITS OF GROWING ALOES

- There will be colour in your garden in the winter from white, rich yellow, and sunset colours through to flame red as well as many bi-coloured varieties.
- Aloes boost biodiversity and encourage wildlife in your garden, including bees and birds - many species of birds, from Sunbirds to Black Headed Orioles, feed on Aloe flowers.
- Aloes provide nesting sites and shelter for birds and geckos.

LANDSCAPING WITH ALOES

- FEATURE PLANTS Strategically place one or more Aloes in your garden where they will make a strong statement, especially when in flower.
- IN POTS ON PATIOS AND PAVING Many hybrids do particularly well in pots.
 Select an Aloe suitable for the space available and pot size.
- IN ROCKERIES This garden type is making a big comeback among top landscapers because it is a 'water-wise' gardening option.



- ADD VARIETY TO YOUR FLOWER BEDS by inter-planting Aloes amongst other plants.
- ALOES can be very effective when used in mass planting.

CARING FOR ALOES

- PLANT with mature kraal manure or compost and with a handful of bonemeal.
 Mulch with a 2cm layer of compost in Spring.
- FERTILISE monthly with a foliar feed of Orgsome, an eco-friendly nutrient available from WITKOPPEN WILDFLOWER NURSERY.
- ALOES NEED lots of sun, well drained soil and some water.
- PESTS such as Aloe Mite (Cancer),
 White Scale and Snout Beetle can be
 easily controlled. Cut out Aloe Mite with
 a sharp knife, paint leaves affected
 by white scale with cooking oil, and
 spray with a mixture of PYRAL organic
 pesticide and a tea made from pipe
 tobacco, to control Snout Beetle.

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YOUR WINTER GARDEN DOESN'T NEED TO BE AS DREARY AS THE WEATHER

he days might be shorter now, and the nights long and cool, but 'green fingers' will still be twitching and there is always something to do in the garden. So, dress up warmly and dig right in!

Things you can do this winter in your garden:

- Hoe borders regularly to keep down the weeds
- · Be water-wise
- Harvest lettuce, radish, and other salad ingredients
- Sharpen your pruning sheers
- Send your lawn mower and brush cutter in for servicing and new blades
- Mow your lawn every second week or as required.

Also, picking sweet pea flowers regularly will make the plants produce more. Plant a creeper with bright yellow flowers over a trellis next to your patio. Focal plants like flax (phormium) are eye-catching in winter landscaping. Plant blossom trees like flowering peaches, plums, cherries and crab apples.

Prepare beds for winter annuals by working in generous amounts of compost and superphosphate. Sweet peas, poppies, daisies and primulas are some of the most significant flowers to plant.

Numerous gardens have been inspired by poppies. They are beautiful to look at, especially when the sunlight shines through their translucent colours. They have proven their ability to transform drab winter gardens into show-stopping displays. Early June is the right time to plant poppy seedlings to ensure that they weave their magic in your garden this spring.

Now is also the right time for you to start planting your sweet peas. With their multitude of sweetly scented pastel blooms, sweet peas are the ultimate forerunner of spring and they make excellent cut flowers. Just decide if you are going for the bush or the climbing variety and choose a sunny spot in front of your patio, entrance or along a pathway where the sight and smell of the flowers can be fully experienced.

Daisies are a gardener's best friend as they are cheerful and easy to grow. You can choose from the wide variety of the daisy family. Most of them warrant a place in the garden, as they bring a bloom to the garden in late spring. Plant them in any sunny spot in well-drained, compost-enriched soil. They can also tolerate a little shade.

REMEMBER

Bird feeding station

- Get your fine compost for your citrus trees and papaws
- Get your slug and snail control
- Harvest early potatoes
- Look out for weeds
- Cover tender flowers against the frost
- Transplant roses now if necessary.

LAWN

When it comes to the lawn, winter is many gardeners' nightmare. Depending on the climate in your area, it means either a muddy mess or sad, bare turf. Make sure you maintain your lawn this winter to keep it looking good. Cut down on mowing, buy some contour lawn dressing or fine compost for your lawn to encourage root development, and keep lush and healthy growth. Make sure you water your grass after applying the lawn dressing. Consistently rake your lawn, remove the fallen leaves and other debris. Remove any broad leaf weeds.

SHOT HOLE BORER

These beetles seem to be a problem in SA at the moment

he polyphagous Shot Hole Borer (PSHB), also known as *Euwallacea Fornicatus*, is able to cause a great deal of damage to our environment, and it has recently been discovered in South Africa.

These beetles, which are approximately 2mm long, are native to South East Asia, which means that the beetle has no natural predator in South Africa and so it can spread like wildfire. To make matters worse, this beetle has a symbiotic relationship with certain types of fungi, like *Fusarium Euwallacea*. The fungus is the beetles' main source of food in addition to its being the main cause associated with the wilting of trees. The beetle is believed to use other types of fungi to help with colonisation of infected trees as well.

This beetle, along with the associated fungi, has caused tremendous damage to trees across the US (specifically California) and regions of the Middle East. Considering the devastation caused by this beetle in Sandton and in Knysna, (currently infesting over 200 indigenous tree species from 28 different plant families), this beetle could cause one of South Africa's largest ecological tragedies.

HOW DOES THE BEETLE INFEST THE TREE?

The beetle, itself, does not kill the tree, but the fungus accompanying the beetle does. The fungus infects the tree's vascular system which then affects and/or stops the flow of water and nutrients within the tree.

HOW TO IDENTIFY THE SHOT HOLE BORER

Unfortunately, the beetles are the size of sesame seeds and can be hard to spot, however, you can identify an infected tree by looking for the following signs:

- Wilting or missing leaves
- Dead or dying branches
- Entry or exit holes in the bark (the size of a pen tip) these holes may have staining around them
- Shotgun-like lesions on the bark at entry or exit hole
- Sugar Volcanoes on the bark at entry or exit hole
- Blotches of oozing resin on the bark at entry or exit holes
- Wood frass (wood powder) on the bark at entry or exit holes.

WHAT CAN I DO ABOUT PSHB?

The PSHB beetle drills very deeply into the wood, which is why no remedy has, as yet, been discovered for this pest. We recommend KOINOR at this stage, but results are, unfortunately, not guaranteed.

The public can also aid in the management of the spreading of this infestation by reporting any signs to FABI (Forestry and Biotechnology Institute).

The discovery of this beetle in South Africa is a major concern to foresters, farmers, tree fellers and landscapers as these beetles are very aggressive and are known as tree killers.

We have a large biodiversity in South Africa hosting 299 species of mammals and 858 species of birds, all depending on trees for their food and shelter. It is our duty to take care of the natural beauty we are blessed with.

their different kinds of bubbly, with some processes taking 24 to 30 months, and others taking 6 years. They must be doing it right, as their Monro Brut 2012 won MCC of the year in the 2019 Platter Guide!

Their love of and commitment to preserving the environment is evident from their use of solar power to provide for most of their needs outside of harvesting time. They are able to provide sufficient energy to power pumps for the dams and the cellar receives its lighting requirements through solar domes. They also use sustainable natural cork as opposed to screw caps and have a strong focus on water conservation, recycling and greening initiatives.

Great care is taken in everything they produce and there is a story behind every bottle and every back label. In line with their environmental approach, they use nature to control nature, for example, by having ducks to control the snails in the vineyard. These initiatives are incorporated into the back labels, so have a look next time you see one of their bottles!

If you are in the area, be sure to visit Villiera, where they don't only offer wine tastings but also chocolate and bubbly, and nougat and bubbly tastings, as well as game drives.

he resources that are available and the access to information are abundant and instant. Social media platforms have made global networking easy and convenient. If there is a question, there is certainly an answer; if there is a problem, there is a solution to be found. At the start of any initiative, be it training for a marathon, birthing a new business venture, or deciding to get engaged, there tends to be an air of positivity and hopefulness – otherwise, why would one even begin? Excitement, even though a positive emotion, can cause a number of blind spots.

LET'S EXPLORE THIS FOR A MOMENT

Michael is training for an ultramarathon, a gruelling 100km trail run along the remote terrain of the Witteberg Mountain range. It is the toughest trail run in South Africa. Runners are expected to navigate the trail themselves with the aid of a map, a compass or a GPS unit. There are no refuelling points along the way to fill up on food and water, so each runner must take a full supply of what they need to sustain themselves whilst taking note of how additional weight will affect endurance levels. They are also running at a height of between 2200 - 2500m above sea level.

In preparation for this, Michael has spent the last 9 months working closely with sports nutritionists, performance coaches, trainers and previous ultramarathon winners. He also has past experience to assist him – he has had a huge passion for endurance sport since he was a child, and has spent the greater part of his teen years at competitions and races across the country. He is fit – mentally, emotionally and physically – and ready to pursue his dream of finishing this race.

The race starts at 4am and the participants have 30 hours to complete the race. With the best intentions and armed with a positive mindset, Michael starts off well and continues strongly for the first 25km. After the 30km mark, he starts to notice a pain in his shin and a cramp developing in his shoulder from a previous injury. This slows him down substantially but he carries on. A few more kilometres into the race, he slips on some rocks and falls hard on his hands

and knees. This further aggravates his injuries. During the fall, one of his water canisters cracks and he loses half of his water supply.

The race has now become more of a mental challenge for him as he struggles just to keep pace.

A sense of hopelessness and despondency starts to rear up and he realises how alone he is out in the wilderness. There is no one else around him. It's just him and the cold mountains. He knows that the finish line is over 40km away and with very little water left, blisters on his feet, a sharp pain in his leg and a heavy feeling of breathlessness from the lack of oxygen, he sits down on the cold gravelled ground and puts his head in his hands.





RENAULT DUSTER 4X4

The Duster has been characterised by its rugged go-anywhere styling that left the impression of an 'all bark and no bite' package, however, can the newly-released 4WD Duster finally prove the substance of its macho appearance just as its



here is no denying the sheer size of the crossover market in South Africa today, and with most manufacturers churning them out as fast as possible, it becomes very difficult to separate the diamonds from the rough. Put simply, the Duster is one of those diamonds.

The Duster has always been aimed at the adventurous family or individual that yearns to break free out of rush-hour traffic and tackle the unbeaten path in the quest for adventure. It's easy to see why the 4WD Duster would suit that market perfectly, as it

has 210mm of ground clearance, coupled with a transmission mode selector offering various 4WD options, such as Lock Mode which will distribute power evenly to all four wheels, and Auto Mode which sends power to the front or rear axle upon the detection of wheel slip.

Gravel roads are met with comfort and minimal effort, whereas extreme soft sand and rock crawling give the Duster a good run for its money. And that's just fine, because the capabilities of the 4WD Duster are more than enough for its target market, especially as it is one of the only

true 4WD capable crossovers at such an attractive price point of just under R340k.

Sadly, though, it isn't all sunshine and roses for the Duster 4WD as it is only available in 6-speed manual guise with Renault's proven 1.5dCi oil-burner kicking out 80kW and 260Nm. I am usually a fan of stick and clutch, however in the manual format, the Dusters gear ratios are alarmingly close together which proved to be quite a mission in rush-hour traffic.

Although the Duster's power output isn't the most exciting, it's still more



than enough to execute overtakes comfortably. The fuel consumption will definitely put a smile on your face, though. Renault claims 5.2l/100km and I managed to get 5.4/100km out of the mid-sized family SUV.

Keep in mind that the Duster has always been a cost-effective offering in the segment. Whilst the new Duster is worlds apart from its predecessor in terms of refinement and styling, you will still find the odd cheap plastic here and there, but it is certainly no deal-breaker. Thankfully, the infotainment system has been moved further up the dashboard, making usability that much easier with AppleCarPlay and Android Auto soon to be released in the 2019 models. Interior space in the new Duster is vastly improved with a boot capacity of 414 litres while the rear seats are upright.

From behind the wheel, the Duster is a pleasantly comfortable vehicle to drive with few bumps and altercations upsetting the ride quality, however, its softly sprung suspension does have one major flaw being the evident amount of body-roll when cornering at a speed, although most Duster owners are likely to never notice it. Steering is appropriately weighted to give the driver a sense that they are driving something more significant than a hatchback.

Overall, the Duster 4WD is an excellent package. Having said that, it might be a better option to go for a higher spec-ed 2WD derivative with Renault's EDC auto box. Unless you are absolutely certain that you will be conquering mountains rather than pavements, the forgoing of 4WD in favour of an automatic transmission will definitely be worth it.

olour specialists and brand consultants, mindful of the psychological effects of colour, say blue is the colour that people associate with depth and stability. It is a calming colour symbolising trust, loyalty, wisdom, faith, truth, and heaven, and is considered beneficial to mind and body.

Cycling through Andalusia and Portugal a few years ago I noticed how, in the villages, the white-washed houses had their windows and doors framed with blue – a carry-over, I was told, from when the Moors occupied the Iberian Peninsula. They believed blue warded off evil spirits.

In Portugal, the Moorish craze for blue, particularly in the form of blue ceramic tiles, is as strong today as it was when the Moorish empire collapsed 500 years ago.

Much as we love blue, we could never be attracted to eat blue-coloured food. We love a blue sky and the way the sun picks out the vivid blue of a kingfisher's back and, say, the iridescence of the Cape Glossy Starling, but there's a mysterious paradox. When we are depressed, we say we are feeling blue. We speak of having blue moods.

There's that rather melancholy music genre known as 'the Blues'. As a term for depression it's been in use for at least 200 years. The American bird artist, John James Audubon wrote in his 1827 *The Birds of America* of having "had the blues".

Some slimmers, apparently, use a blue light to illuminate the interior of their fridges. It apparently decreases the appeal of its contents.

Blue is indeed the rarest pigment in nature. In fact there are no truly blue flowers, nor blue birds, nor blue butterflies for it is not pigment that makes them blue. Whether it is agapanthus or plumbago or the brilliant blue of a kingfisher, it is all a trick of nature. The blue results from light falling upon microscopic light-scattering surfaces in feathers or petals which allow only blue light waves to be reflected. All the other colours of the prism are subdued.

One of the most breath-taking sights I have ever seen was in a canopy forest not far from Cuiaba in central Brazil. I was following a gloomy footpath deep under the forest canopy and there, on the ground in a shaft of sunlight, gently fanning its wings, was a blue morpho butterfly as big as my hand. Its almost dazzling iridescence caused it to shine like an electric light — all a trick of the tiny reflective surfaces.

It seems that only in relatively recent times – the last few thousand years of *Homo's* million-years of existence – have we had the ability to see the colour blue. There's a tribe in Namibia that still can't. Shown a chart with a dozen green squares and a single conspicuously bright blue square among them, none was able to spot the blue.

The literature of the Ancient Greeks makes no mention of blue. Homer's *Odyssey* refers to black and white and occasionally red and yellow – but blue, never. The colour of the sea is described as 'wine-dark'.

It seems that about 6 000 years ago, we began to develop blue pigment for the first time. It came from lapis lazuli, a rare, deep blue metamorphic stone mined in Afghanistan and from which semi-precious jewellery was made.

The Egyptians were greatly attracted to its brilliance and would grind it down to produce a pigment which they called blue. As far as it is known this was the first time that a word meaning blue appeared in any language.¹

The use of blue dyes slowly spread across the Middle East and to Rome but only the ultra-wealthy could afford them. Blue was to remain virtually unknown in western Europe for many centuries. Then, at the end of the Middle Ages, lapis reached deeper into the Continent and produced the ultramarine of the Renaissance painters. It was otherwise reserved for fabrics worn by royalty.

Was it because blue is so rare in nature that nobody saw it until recent times as being remarkable? What about the sky? Surely that was blue? There's a theory that we did not see it as blue until we recognised blue pigment. Apparently, children perceive the sky as being colourless until it is pointed out to them as being blue.

1 There are today, thanks to chemistry, scores of different blues and thousands of words - encompassing hundreds of languages and dialects - to describe them. But none, I imagine, more colourful than those in Zulu which include:

luhlaza okwesibhakabhaka for blue and okuluhlaza okwesibhakabha Okumnyama for navy blue.





LEARNING THROUGH PLAY

n the past, learning was understood as gaining mastery of a significant amount of knowledge, usually in the form of content transmitted by a teacher - children were 'taught'. Teachers trained in the early childhood phase of education know that this formalised, top-down approach does not suit young children, however, and that rather than spending more and more time on maths worksheets and phonics work cards, our children should be playing, talking, climbing, constructing, imagining, questioning and exploring.

Recognising that play is an essential component of childhood, international researcher and inspirational early years teacher Galina Dolya has devised a curriculum that develops cognitive, behavioural and communicative 'tools' within a creative, playful and engaging context based on the teachings of Russian psychologist Lev Vygotsky.

The Vygotskian approach recognises that children need to play, explore and experience their world in a tangible and concrete way in order to build the foundations for academic learning in their early years. The approach is therefore playful and engaging, carefully structured to build the vocabulary, language, reasoning, sequencing, classification, conceptual language, tools and higher mental functions that prepare the child to learn.

When Junior Preparatory principal, Mrs Blackhurst, and Grade 0 staff at Dainfern College discovered the Vygotskian approach, they were very excited by its possibilities. As they put the approach into practice at the College they found it built capacity and a foundation for learning in the children that simply amazed them. The success of the method prompted them, in collaboration with Key to Learning Africa, to host Galina Dolya as the keynote speaker at a two-day early childhood development conference, so that the latest thinking and teaching methods in this vital phase of education could be shared with teachers across South Africa. Themed 'Playful Learning, Learningful Play', the conference took place at Dainfern College in April and was attended by almost 300 delegates.

In her address, Dolya explained that, instead of bombarding children with information, we should use play, (which develops abstract thinking), as the transition to adulthood, thereby amplifying childhood, rather than accelerating their childhood too quickly.

Being ready for school, says Dolya, does not necessarily mean being *able* to read and write, but instead, being ready *to learn how* to read and write. Our goal should be to develop a love and hunger for learning in our children, rather than simply filling their heads with knowledge.

Play is central to how young children learn and make sense of their world, socially, intellectually, emotionally and ethically. At Dainfern College the Grade 0 teachers understand the relationship between play and learning, and how to put play at the centre of teaching. They are seeing remarkable results in this vital phase of education.

commented on how these children have been more settled and concentration levels have improved in class.







nimal Behaviourists tend to be called in as a last resort, often when a pet has become aggressive or unmanageable, or when the relationship between pet and family (or other animals in the home) has broken down completely. At this point, a lot of hard work is required to get everybody on track and, sadly, it may be too late and the situation may be irrevocable.

We asked Twisted Whiskers' consultant behaviour experts, Samantha Walpole and Julia Davies-Carter, what they would like people to know about interacting with animals in order to PREVENT PROBLEMS before they arise.

RULE #1 RESPECT THE PREDATOR

Regardless of the fact that dogs and cats have lived alongside humans in a domesticated context for millennia and, as a consequence, have evolved into very different beings to their wild ancestors, it's vital to remember that they are still predators. They will always revert to fight or flight behaviour when placed in situations where they feel compromised, and this can (and often does) result in trauma. Understanding animals' body language is key to ensuring that you and your loved ones (both humans and other pets) are safely interacting with the dogs and cats you encounter. These handy infographics show the common canine and feline 'amber lights' that alert us to the fact that the animal is communicating distress.



Look at these signals as a whole, rather than in isolation. If you see an animal showing a 'closed off' stance rather than a 'soft', open, receptive one, beware! You (or your child or pet) have overstepped and are setting up a situation where a frightened, overwhelmed animal may behave unpredictably.

RULE #2 LET ANIMALS APPROACH YOU

We all fall into this trap. Think back to the last time you saw a cute fluff-ball of a puppy, a mischievous kitten, or a gorgeous silver-muzzled senior. What did you do? Most likely stormed the animal with kisses and cuddles and, chances are, completely missed a bunch of the signals listed here.... Truth be told, most of us are lucky we still have our faces in place! It's a testimony to the patience of animals that we do.

Imagine taking your child into Sandton City and allowing every person in the place to grab and kiss him or her. It would take but a few seconds for the child to become overwhelmed, fearful and anxious. The same goes for our fur-children. It's disrespectful and downright dangerous to expect every animal to love you and enjoy receiving attention from you.

Possibly the most important rule any behaviourist would have us remember is DON'T APPROACH AN ANIMAL. Ask the owner's permission to interact and 'ask' the animal by watching his body language and allowing him to approach you.

So, how do we know an animal is receptive to interacting? As far as both

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dogs and cats are concerned, UNLESS YOU SEE A RELAXED, WIGGLY, 'SOFT' DEMEANOR, LEAVE THEM ALONE! If the animal comes up to you with fluid movements, soft eyes and weaving body,

they are showing you that they're open to a chat, a cuddle or a game and it's safe to proceed in a gentle and respectful manner. A wagging tail isn't always a green light so look out for big circular wags, as if the tail is wagging the dog. With cats, a raised S-shaped tail is a good sign.

RULE #3 MONITOR ALL CHILD-PET INTERACTION

Social media is filled with videos of children bouncing on dogs, 'carrying' cats and tiny puppies around, etc. and they get thousands of likes and "How adorable!" comments.... Until a child or animal is injured. Kids take a while to get to grips with the nuances of personto-person interactions and cannot be expected to pick up on the subtle cues shown by animals as well. It's up to adults to firmly monitor all interaction and ensure that both the children and the animals in the situation feel safe and

comfortable. Follow our behaviourists' tips to prevent tears and trauma.

- · Children should be taught how to interact with animals safely and appropriately. Young kids tend to squeeze and can do serious damage to little critters - don't allow them to handle animals until they have learned to do so with care and consideration. Rather than children picking animals up, have them sit on a chair or stand quietly, depending on the size and disposition of the pet, and allow the animal to come to them for gentle interaction, always supervised by an adult. And by supervised, we mean that the adult should have a clear understanding of the body-language cues mentioned above and be able to step in immediately if the animal shows signs of anxiety.
- When kids play with animals, there should be NO ROUGH-HOUSING, as this teaches animals that it's okay to be rough. Cats should only ever be engaged in play with dangler-type toys, not twiddling fingers or toes, as this encourages unwanted scratching and biting behaviour.
- No child (or adult) should ever hug a dog or cat. Wrapping your arms around an animal's neck is seen by the pet as a restraint and is almost always unwelcome. Children also love to kiss

pets and this should never be allowed. A lovely idea is to teach kids to kiss their own hand and wipe the kiss onto the pet's body, or rather to blow a kiss to their doggy or kitty to show him or her love.

- Don't approach a sleeping animal. In the wild, animals are at their most vulnerable while sleeping. Waking them from slumber is very much a case of poking the proverbial bear and is unlikely to result in a positive experience.

TIPS REGARDING ANIMAL INTERACTIONS WITH EACH OTHER Inter-dog play is a very important part of social interaction, with both parties taking turns to be the initiator (I chase you, you chase me). There should be plenty of 'mini-breaks' in between bouts and noone should ever be bullied or exhausted. It goes without saying that no dog should ever be set upon and dominated by a group of dogs. The same body-language signals discussed earlier apply in animal-to-animal interaction and this should only be allowed to continue if both animals are in a soft, playful, receptive frame of mind (and body).

Animals who meet for the first time and display stiffened stances, rigid faces, etc. are not simply 'sussing one another out'. Dogs straining at the ends of their leads, 'shouting' at one another are also not interested in a friendly 'How Do You Do'. In both instances, remove the animals from the situation. They do not like each other and encouraging further interaction may end badly for all concerned.

Animals are individuals too - in the same way that we as humans don't get a kick out of every other person we meet, dogs and cats don't either.

Play between cats is practice for hunting. Remembering the cat's natural HUNT-EAT-GROOM-SLEEP cycle, which is repeated throughout the day, will go a long way towards helping you to interact positively with them. The best time for play (HUNT) is before a meal, and the best time to get the brush out (GROOM) is after food (EAT) and before a rest (SLEEP). When playing with cats, always ensure that there's a yummy food reward at the end of 'the hunt', or kitty will be left feeling frustrated.

When dogs and cats interact, the safety of the cat is always paramount. When introducing a dog to a cat, allow the cat to see the dog outside through a window or sliding door to start. Her body language at this early stage should already give you a clue as to whether she's interested and keen to know more about the dog, or completely put off. If, based on this first reaction, you feel that face-to-face communication can be initiated, ensure that the cat always has a choice to leave the room. The dog should be on a lead and the cat allowed to freely exit if she feels threatened.

If the dog shows inappropriate behaviour eg. barking, lunging, whining, do not reprimand! Quietly remove the dog from the area and call a professional Behaviour Consultant. Once a dog has been allowed to bounce all over a cat, any chance of a healthy relationship between the two has been ruined forever. Similarly, if a cat goes into hiding after being introduced to a dog, know that there isn't much hope of the relationship working out. If you persist, your cat will most likely leave home and move in with someone else.

We are legally responsible for our pets' behaviour and it should be our goal to always facilitate positive interactions between people and our animals. We set everyone up for success by understanding how dogs and cats show their feelings and by ensuring that children and others who may not have had the privilege of enjoying a healthy relationship with animals are taught to respect them and interact safely with them.

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

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




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DENSA'S SILVER JUBILEE
