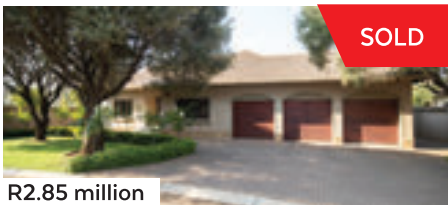

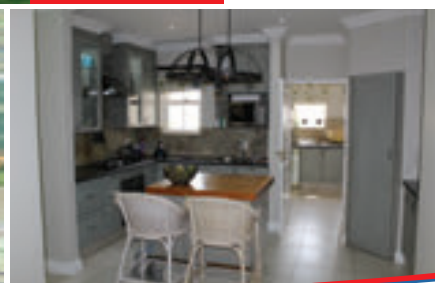
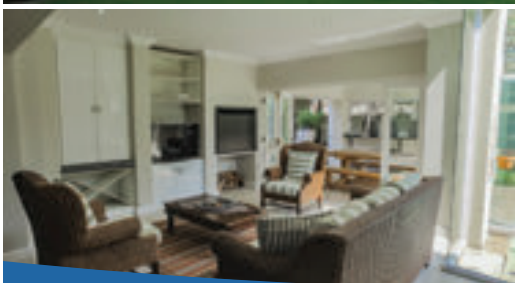
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### Dear Residents

The New Year has started with a gallop. As time is flying, one realises that one needs to adapt to the day-to-day routine as quickly as possible, but then it is also important to take the necessary precautionary steps not to fall off your horse. It is always good practice keeping your horse at a gallop!



It is important that the following access rules are placed on the table at the beginning of the year for all to take note of and to assist with the effective management of the Estate:

- All household workers had to be registered by the 31st of January 2019. This includes domestic workers, gardeners, au pairs, drivers, house sitters, et cetera. The access of these workers will be suspended until the registration is carried out by the residents at the Estate Office.
- New yellow 2019 access cards will be issued to all the household workers. These cards must always be carried on the person of such worker, when he or she is inside/ accesses the Estate. If the biometric access system is off, the Security will request such workers to produce

their access cards to access the Estate.

- Household workers who are working for more than one resident must be registered at each of the residences, which will appear as such on the access card.
- All the building contractors, garden services, doggy parlours, gas deliveries, newspaper deliveries, scholar bus transporters, etc must be re-registered for 2019 on the biometric system, with the prescribed fee to be paid.
- Residents must please update their personal information at the Estate Office by the 31st of March 2019. The registration forms were circulated to all.
- All taxis/Ubers must sign in at the main gate with the resident to confirm the access of the vehicle, even if the resident is in the vehicle.

Whilst on the topic of household workers, the Department of Labour announced in December 2018 the new wage increases for all domestic workers (as defined in the Labour Act), effective from the 3rd of December 2018. I trust that the following information will be of assistance to employers.

You would have noticed by now that several home crafted refuse bins were put out at strategic points in the Estate. We appeal to all our residents and visitors to make use of these bins, which are cleaned out weekly. Since the bins were in use, there was a noticeable decrease in littering. A fitting slogan could be "dump it in the Village bin".



The in-house recycling programme carried out by Remade Recycling is continuing as usual. All the recyclables (e.g. plastic, glass, tins, paper) are collected on a Thursday. The green bin or bags are used and must be left on the sidewalk early in the morning. Any big cardboard boxes can be flattened and left with the bin or bags on the sidewalk. Remade will collect them on the same collecting



day. For November 2018, Remade collected 11 440 kg of recyclables, the third most amongst ten estates from where Remade is collecting. It should become our challenge to move into the first place!

Pets play a big role in the lives of many people, hence the HOA rules on pets have adopted a soft though firm approach towards pet management in the Estate. In the first instance, pets must be registered at the Estate Office. From time-to-time, dogs do manage to escape from their homes, and roam



around in the Estate. A marked collar on a dog makes it easy for the Security to trace the

owners. A stronger approach will be taken on residents whose dogs are not registered and not wearing a collar. Pet owners need to remember that there are those residents who do not want pets for various reasons, and we must always be conscious of their feelings, especially with reference to the ongoing barking, failure to remove the excrement from the lawn of a fellow resident, dogs running loose and being a threat to people in the street, etc.

The position of Irene Farm Villages as a prominent residential estate in Pretoria is always in the forefront of discussions, especially when addressing the question of your property being a good or bad asset, in other words, a good or bad investment. In the article "Where to buy your next house" published in the Financial Mail of December 2018, Joan Muller lifts the veil slightly on this topic. It was encouraging to read, from an Irene Farm Villages private home owner's



perspective, that over the past five years, Irene Farm Villages, in the top end category of sales between R3m - R6m, showed the third largest growth of 31,94%. Hence it is the aim of the Home Owners' Association, supported by the Estate Management, to manage the affairs of the HOA in such a manner that they will contribute to this growth pattern in future.

The progress with the Infrastructure Development Plan is unchanged, pending the submission of the Wet Services Audit Report, which was requested by the City of Tshwane (COT), and expected during January 2019. Once we have received this report, the building plans will be re-submitted to the COT.

The implementation of the new Access Control Network (contract awarded to Bidvest Protea Coin), which includes the new bio-metric readers, scanners and goose-necks, the new IP cameras, the new motor vehicle spike barriers and boom motors and an integrated network link, is in the planning stages. The Project Plan Schedule should be finalised by the end of January 2019 - the plan will be shared well in advance with the residents..

## SECURITY

Amidst a high and ongoing crime rate on the outskirts of the Estate, it is heartening to say that no security breach occurred over the Festive Season and thus far this year. On the 15th of December 2018, the CCTV control centre was struck by lightning, which caused the CCTV-cameras to go down, as well as other security electronic equipment. The appointed service providers for the HOA were on site immediately and attended to the matter and, whilst the repair

works were carried out over the days to follow, contingency plans were put in place to secure the Estate. Bidvest Protea Coin provided additional guards to patrol the Estate with no cost to the HOA. During December 2018, Officer Martin Likhade was the Acting Shift Manager in the absence of Lucas Chego. Martin did excellent work and we would like to thank him.

The Security attended to various domestic matters for example:

- Loud music;
- Setting off of fireworks;
- Roaming dogs;
- Open garage doors;
- Vandalism;
- Private property alarms.

It is important to note that it is usually the Shift Manager, or the Reaction Officer on duty, who will respond to complaints. Often the culprit (offender) will confront the Security, wanting to know the name of the complainant. As part of the Security Standard Operational Procedures, the Security will not make the name of the complainant known. The Estate Management will deal with such requests.

From a security perspective we would like to thank the residents of Irene Farm Villages who are noticeably vigilant and taking their own safety serious by attending to the small things, for example, locking the

garage and outside doors, closing the windows, locking the vehicles in the garage, putting valuables away at night, etc.

Road safety needs to be addressed. The speed limit within the Estate is 40kmh. There are residents who do not stop



at stop streets and who speed. It is difficult for the Estate Management to enforce the traffic rules, because the roads belong to the City of Tshwane. Hence, we appeal to all our residents to abide by the traffic laws and to make the roads in Irene Farm Villages safe.

December was poor collections month for the HOA with many members not paying. Debtors (excl the 3 big accounts), grew with 36%, to R294 304. Account Ability and the Estate Management are actively following up with these members to resolve any unpaid amounts. Still only 24 members of the 654, owe the HOA more than 3 months' levies. Three accounts make up 82% of the money due to the HOA.

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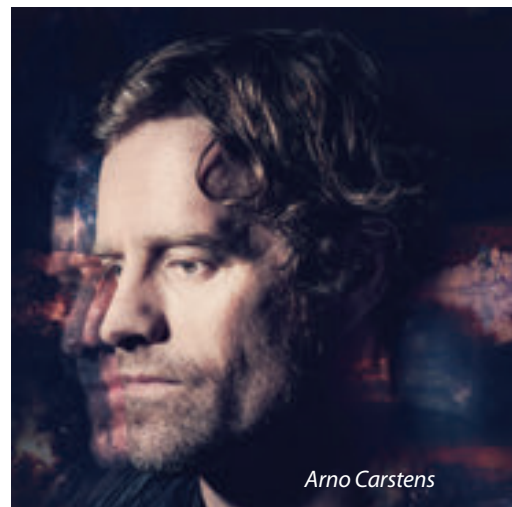
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# LOVE IN ALL ITS DIFFERENT GUISES

# The world's most famous fish

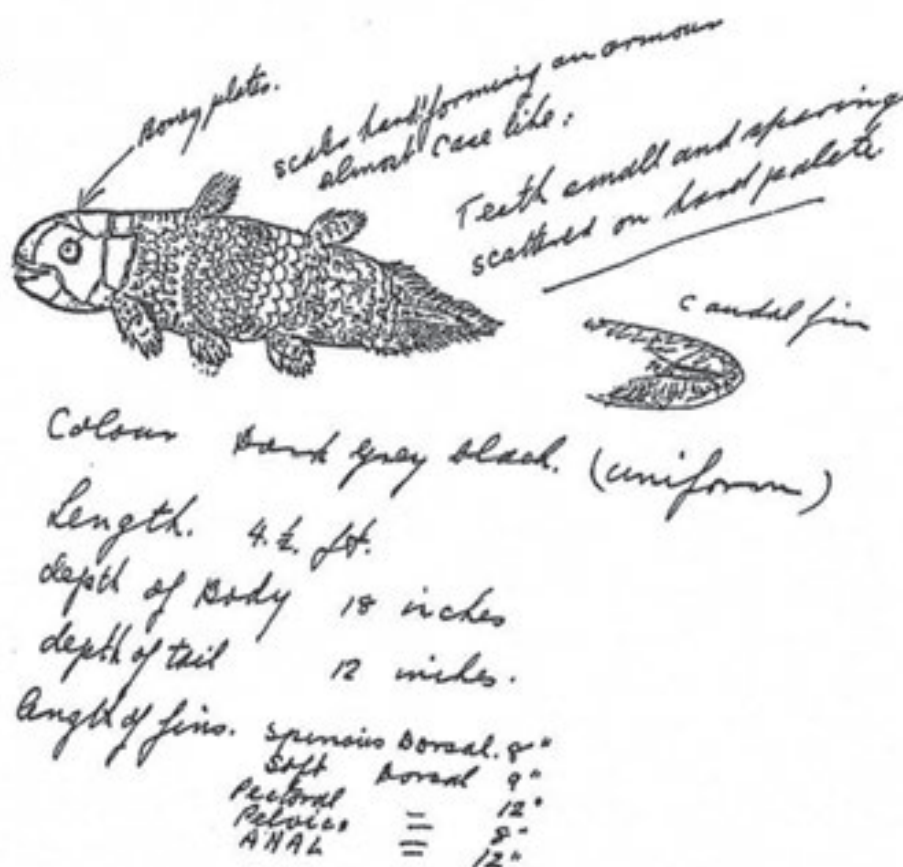

"Somebody's just discovered a live dinosaur!" Those were, I always believed, the first words of Professor JLB Smith as he rose from sitting at the breakfast table just after Christmas in 1938. He was staring at a letter in his hand and for some moments stood in stunned silence. It was a letter from an East London woman.

On the 3rd of January this year, it was exactly 80 years since that letter arrived at the professor's holiday home in Knysna – that was the day the story of the world's most famous fish began.

The woman, Marjorie Courtenay-Latimer, director of the East London Museum, had written to Smith about a large newly-caught fish she had just retrieved from the city's fish market. It was her amateurish sketch that riveted his attention.

Smith was puzzled at first but then, from the deep recesses of his memory, he remembered seeing pictures of coelacanth fossils found around the globe over the years, all dated between 420 million and 65 million years. Sixty five million years ago ... that was when a meteor smacked into the earth causing sun-blocking debris to circle the planet for years, extinguishing the dinosaurs and uncountable numbers of other creatures.

Naturally, it was assumed coelacanths died in 'The Great Extinction'. Smith's often quoted remark about the dinosaur was in fact not uttered, according to a

definitive book by Professor Mike Bruton on the notoriously taciturn and often difficult 'JLB' and his more outgoing family – and his celebrated fish.

Smith was a professor of chemistry at the time but was also a widely respected and knowledgeable amateur ichthyologist (fish expert). I never met JLB but knew Margaret, his widow who, by the time I met her, was director of the JLB Smith Institute of Ichthyology at Rhodes University, and I worked on projects with their son, William, the country's most popular science teacher. Mother and son

were compulsive and brilliant teachers as is their biographer, Bruton himself – an articulate scientist with many and varied interests.

I thought I knew a bit about the Smiths but as I became absorbed in Bruton's 344 page book on their private lives – with all its warts, I realised how little I knew about the effect of this spell-binding episode of science history and its impact on their lives. Smith, in some ways, was inexplicably slow in getting to East London to actually see the fish for himself, yet, that January, he immediately wrote to Courtenay-Latimer saying he strongly suspected she had on her hands a creature that would shake the scientific world. "Zoologically sensational," he called it.

Smith said it was imperative that she preserved the fish's organs but the museum director had had nowhere to preserve them and had already thrown them away for they were putrid. It was heroic enough that she, alone, got the human-sized fish (58,6kg) from the harbour to her museum and preserved it.

That day was December 22 1938. Her letter took 12 days to reach JLB. Bruton, with unlimited access to the Smith's papers, recalled her description of the moment she saw the fish: "I picked away at the layer of slime to reveal the most beautiful fish I had ever seen. It was a pale mauvy blue, with faint flecks of whitish spots; it had an iridescent silver-blue-green sheen all over. It was covered in hard scales, and it had four limb-like fins and a strange puppy-dog tail."

Its colouring soon disappeared.

Smith wrote to her saying, "I cannot help but mourn that the soft parts of the fish were not preserved even had they been almost putrid. I am sorry to say that I think their loss represents one of the

greatest tragedies of zoology."

Even so, Smith himself, took another 44 days to get up to East London. Admittedly, it was 580km away and on rough roads and the professor had a pile of Rhodes University exam papers to mark. He was frankly also scared of making an ass of himself. As Bruton says, he realised the find was "utterly fantastic and highly unlikely". Smith told Courtenay-Latimer, "...my mind still refuses to grasp this tremendous impossibility."

It proved indeed to be a sensation and rocketed JLB and his wife, Margaret, into a new life. Smith became, in the public's eye, the world's most famous ichthyologist. The fish, which quickly became a crown jewel of evolutionary science, had been caught off the East London coast and now the search was on for another specimen.

JLB felt the French Comores in the Indian Ocean was the likely home range and, by way of posters, offered a substantial reward for a specimen. World War 2 came and went. So did the 1940s.

It was 14 years later, again around Christmas, that a second coelacanth

was caught off the French Comores. JLB feared the French would claim it or that it would decompose in the mid-summer heat. But nobody was prepared to fly him out and bring the fish home.

As a last resort he appealed to the Prime Minister, DF Malan. Everybody knew Malan believed evolution contradicted the bible and yet, Malan, who apparently had JLB's hefty tome, *The Sea Fishes of Southern Africa*, at his bedside, was impressed on hearing JLB himself on the phone – and also impressed by JLB's pleas that national prestige was at stake.

He assigned an Airforce Dakota and maximum crew to take JLB and bring the fish home. When JLB, known to

be rather humourless, knelt, when he knelt down to examine the huge fish, he wept. He planned to name it *Malania anjouanae* (for Malan) for he thought it was a different genus but it was later discovered it was a smaller, damaged version of the original which was named after Courtenay-Latimer - *Latimeria chalumnae*. The specific name refers to the Chalumna River mouth near East London where the first one had been trawled.

The coelacanth is now listed, internationally, as "critically endangered" – just one degree above the final category: "extinct".

Extinct! How bitterly ironic that would be.



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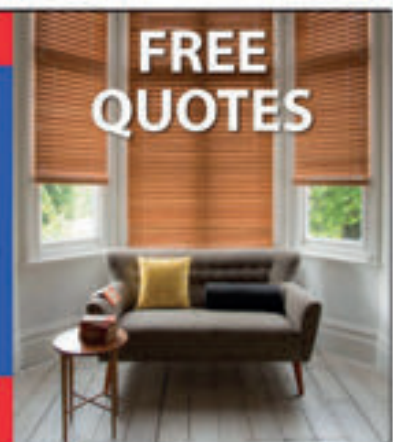
