Dear Residents

It was great to be back at the estate after a restful vacation which took us to the Northern parts of South Africa. During our visit to the Kruger National Park we had the privilege of witnessing a herd of about 200 to 300 buffalo cross the road near Punda Maria. And again, to witness the majestic Boabab tree, which is my favourite amongst all our indigenous trees and only found in the North of the Limpopo province.

NEW ACCESS CONTROL SYSTEM

It is only when one is away from the office that one becomes aware of all the work that is carried out by one's colleagues. We have gone through a tough time at the office to make the new access control system function effectively. We have come to realise that it is not that difficult to develop a system. The trick lies in the implementation. During the implementation period, the Estate Management had to deal with numerous complaints, enquiries, misunderstandings of the system, the use of outdated cell phones and the unwillingness to adapt to changes. However, due to the commitment by a dedicated Estate Management team, we were able to address and resolve most of the teething problems.

The new Glovisitor app brought a new dimension of residential security to the homeowner. It is important for the homeowner to take responsibility for his or her visitors, contractors, deliveries, collections and any other form of service, which mainly focuses on allowing short term access to the estate. This responsibility is based on the way in which the new app will be used by each resident. Residents are reminded that the Security Personnel will no longer be phoning residents to approve the access of a visitor, contractor, delivery, shuttle service, etc. We want to thank all our residents for the positive way in which they accepted








and communicated their enquiries regarding the functionality of the app.



The focus has now shifted from the short-term access to the long-term contractors. This is where the major challenge for an effective security system lies. The Glovent Portal now allows for residents to log onto their Glo-Portal webpage to register their long-term contractors, who will be on site for more than five working days. Once a resident has registered his/ her main contractor on the portal, the portal will allow for a link from the resident to the main contractor. The contractor will then be requested to register online all the workers who will be working on-site. This

pre-registration of the long-term contractor will interface with the Impro bio-metric system (fingerprints). On the arrival of the long-term contractor at the main gate, the contractor shall report to the check-in window, where the Impro system will acknowledge the pre-registration of the main contractor and the workers. Their fingerprints will then be taken to activate the bio-metric profile of each contract worker. Provision will also be made for payment of the registration fee via EFT. Residents are requested to make use of this new system, which will enhance the enrolment of contract workers at the main gate.

LICENCE PLATE RECOGNITION

With the installation of the new cameras at the two gatehouses, provision was made for the Licence Plate Recognition (LPR) software. This system can identify any wanted vehicle through the Syntel database, which is connected to the central SAPS Operational Control Centre. A prescribed standard operational procedure will be followed by the Security Personnel once a wanted vehicle is identified. This system will contribute to a safer residential community.

SPEED CONTROL

The matter of traffic enforcement in the estate has been raised with residents on several occasions in the recent past. The Homeowners' Association has now acquired the services of Bidvest Protea Coin (BPC) to attend to speed trapping in the estate - this will be carried out by a gualified BPC officer with the Truvelo camera. Residents, visitors, contractors etc. who are caught exceeding the 40kph speed limit, will be issued with a written notice via e-mail and a penalty of R500 per incident will be imposed against the responsible resident's levy account. Residents who fail to stop at stop signs should also expect to be video recorded, with a penalty of R500 to follow. The HOA appeals to all the residents to adhere to the traffic rules. It is for the safety of all of us.



On 12 July 2019, the BPC Security Officers were deployed with the speed capturing apparatus. Several residents were found speeding.

On 2 August 2019, the Chairperson of the CPF EXPO Committee, Mr Gert van Rooyen handed a Certificate of

Appreciation to the Estate Manager and Assistant Estate Manager in recognition of the continued support through the HOA's generous donations.



LANDSCAPING PROGRAMME

The garden and parks winter programme for 2019 is on track. The traffic circle at the North gate has been re-landscaped with a new face-lift of the extended flower bed spokes. The loose rock hedges were placed in gabions to tidy up and make the circle neat and attractive. The Garden Creation Team is also attending to Yellow Wood Park, where the flower beds will be rearranged with new plants. It was a real team effort to accomplish the hard gardening work.

During August and September, 100 new trees will be planted. Provision has been made to plant about five additional trees in most of the parks. Ten different indigenous species were identified, namely the Wisteria tree, Water tree, Lavender tree, Savanna Gardenia, Coral tree, Cape Ash, Pompom tree, Wild Pear, Cape Chestnut and the Wild Plum.







DOG WALK AND MOVIE

The annual Irene Farm Villages Doggie Walk and Pop-Up Movie, which is sponsored by Pam Golding, will take place on Saturday, 14 September 2019, at Primrose Park. The event and dog registration open at 17h00.The doggy walk starts at 18h00, whilst the movie begins at 19h00. All residents who have submitted their entry form will receive vouchers for free refreshments and something to eat. We invite all our residents to take part in this growing annual event.



The Garden Creation Team

There are several important environmental matters, which are brought to your attention, namely:

• Gardeners and garden services are seen sweeping grass, leaves and other small garden materials into the stormwater drains (inlets), instead of collecting them and putting them



into a refuse bag. This could lead to the blockage of the stormwater system when it starts to rain, which could cause a subsidence or sinkhole.

- Irrigation systems are found running for longer periods than normal.
 We appeal to residents who have an irrigation system, to check the timing-system regularly and be on the lookout for unexpected wet areas.
- Household workers are seen washing their employers' vehicles using a hosepipe or cleaning the driveway by hosing it down. It is in the best interest of all that we use water sparingly.

- Recycling: much has been said in the past about recycling. If you notice that your neighbour is not recycling, please encourage them to do so. At the end of the day, it will be one of these small steps taken that will save South Africa.
- There are several Steenbok and Duikers in the estate. They tend to come out at night when they graze. It often happens that they accidentally stroll onto the road and are then blinded by the headlights of vehicles. Please be on the lookout for these small animals.



DONATIONS

Many Irene Farm Villagers responded to the call for donations for The Khomani San Outreach for 2019. The donations received at the gates have been

collected and sorted and we are happy to say that we now have most of the items needed for the 2019 parcels.



The contributions from residents represent the majority of the clothing needed to provide each of the almost 700 people with a parcel that will be packed specifically for them. A great big thank you all who donated so generously to this worthy cause.



KEEPING YOUR FUR BABY SAFE FROM THE UNTHINKABLE

Our precious four-legged child – our kitten we'd been waiting for, for over a year – nearly died. We were fortunate, but we've made some changes to prevent any future harm to our baby.

Kai completes my and my husband's lives. All pet parents will understand and hear my heart when I speak of our tomcat as if he were a little human covered in soft white fur. Kai is a beautiful one-year-seven-months-old Ragdoll neutered boy with a personality like that of a typical little boy: highly curious and inquisitive, and he loves nature just as much as his human Daddy. To accommodate Kai's free spirt, we bought him a GPS tracker for his collar which links to an app on our mobile phones. This allows us to be able to track Kai's movements and feel in complete control of his safety.

On Thursday, 13 June, Kai didn't come home. We immediately tried to track him via the GPS app, but to our devastation no track or trace could be found of our boy. Our estate management immediately assisted with a notification message to residents, in an attempt to trace Kai. I could hear the words of the Ragdoll Breeder from whom we bought Kai echo in my head: "Keep your cat indoors at all times; do not allow your cat to go outside."

One day later, on the following evening, I found Kai in his bed in an unrecognisable condition. His head was covered in blood and he was gasping for air through a bloodied nose and mouth. We rushed Kai to the Valley Farm Veterinary Hospital; we were riddled with guilt and mortification at having to admit our child in such a terrible condition without any explanation of what happened to him! Kai's condition evoked a lot of emotions and desperation.

Valley Farm was very professional and emotionally supportive of the tragic situation Kai was in. Dr Tim took Kai to be examined and a few hours later gave us the prognosis. Kai had been cleaned and evaluated, and immediately treated for dehydration, and 3D scans were

taken to establish the extent of his injuries. Kai had major head injuries, with 3 factures on his jaw and the side of his jaw. Due to the trauma, Kai's third eyelid manifested – what a scary and painful sight to see!

From there, the journey to healing began: from surgery straight to ICU with a feeding tube. The vet reassured us that Kai is a strong boy and that if finances allowed, recovery was possible but would require a lot of patience.

The reason I am sharing this story is twofold. Firstly, I wish to express our appreciation and gratefulness for the very professional medical treatment from all the staff at Valley Farm Animal Hospital, and for the unconditional emotional support in specific from our Ragdoll breeder, Breeze Swartzberg, over the 7-week journey to recovery.

Never before had seven weeks felt this long. Kai was totally depended on us for the 4-hourly tube feeding, for bathing him – paws and jaws – due to the drooling, and for regular bandage changes where the pipe had gone into his oesophagus in his neck. We did not want to make anything about Kai's injury and trauma public until we were reassured by the vet (Dr Judith Benjafield) that the jaw fracture repair was successful. Still, many people called us irrational for spending so much money on our Kai boy.

We manged to build a safe cat enclosure to allow Kai his outside freedom in future, but with boundaries





in place. This brings me to my second reason for sharing Kai's story: Our advice to all cat owners is to not allow your cat unrestricted, free roaming – the consequences extend much further than what anyone or any pet insurance can save you from.

We would like to urge all cat owners to consider the following advice:

- Do not allow your cat free roaming.
- Always keep your cats in the house.
- Remember that no pet insurance covers an accident or injury 100% – read the small print.
- Cat enclosures can be built by professional companies in line with our estate's specifications.

We invite fellow residents to come and


view our cat enclosure on appointment, and we'll gladly share some pointers and references. But the most important thing is to keep your furry babies inside.

TIME TO DUST OFF THE COLD AND HIT THE ROAD RUNNING...

A discussion about Return to Running and Overuse Injuries BY RIA SANDENBERGH PHYSIOTHERAPISTS

As a very average short distance runner, I will confess that my running is like a polar bear. Well, not literally - but it does like to go into hibernation during the winter...only to be rudely awakened by the arrival of spring. It's like a daisyshaped alarm clock that motivates me to hit the road running.

Like most humans, I then want to fly out of the blocks and continue right where I left off – you know, doing the Park Run in 30 min...even after the 3-month hiatus! The body is an amazing 'machine' that is capable of incredible feats, but we must give it time to get back into shape.

The most important thing is: YOU WILL DEFINITELY RUN INTO TROUBLE IF YOU DO TOO, MUCH TOO SOON!

Overuse injuries are most often caused by training errors which include: rapid acceleration of the intensity, duration and frequency of your activity. Poor technique, body alignment, old injuries, incomplete rehabilitation and sudden changes (e.g. new shoes, technique or terrain) can also contribute.

And if you think this is not for you, the latest statistics tell us that: "Up to 70% of recreational and competitive runners sustain overuse injuries during any 12-month period".

Wow! That's a very high percentage of you guys that are running past me in the mornings... So, how do you wake up the Polar Bear without hurting yourself? (a.k.a My Spring Running Action Plan).

I have come across a few simple rules that have kept me and others injury-free after a long running break.

#1. The 10% RULE of exercise:

As a rule of thumb – don't increase your exercise programme by more than 8 - 10% in one week.

There is an interrelation between distance/time and intensity – if you always run 5 km in 30 min (6 min/km)



and you increase your speed to 5:30 min/km you cannot increase the time that you train as well.

#2. The 7-4-2 RULE:

- You are allowed to exercise 7 days of the week
- No more than 4 days of the same discipline
- Only 2 out of 4 of the above-mentioned sessions may be back-to-back.

Physical stress, like simple exercise and activity, is beneficial for your body – it makes the structures stronger. This process, called remodelling, involves both the breakdown and building up of tissue. There is a fine balance between the two, if the breakdown occurs more rapidly than the building up, an overuse injury will occur. Your body can cope with 2 days of build-up, but not 3. To make sure you don't overload, add crosstraining to spice up your week.

Cross-training can include strength training (gym/specific exercises), agility drills, and rhythmical (proprioceptive) exercise. Many runners have also benefitted from Pilates/ Yoga or other forms of cardio fitness such as spinning/ cycling or swimming. If you are currently nursing an injury, this is also a great way to keep your fitness levels up.

The bill of any bird is a wonderful thing. Look how the weavers are able to loop a strand of grass around a branch, fasten it with an elaborate knot and then, from the resultant loop, weave an intricate basket-like nest strong enough to not only withstand a brisk wind but also to form a cosy home for its chicks. No hands involved – just a short little beak.

Birds, in evolving from reptiles and taking to the air, sacrificed their forelimbs. Their arms and hands became the framework for their wings. Their beaks (bills) had to take on the functions of forelimbs.

They had to use them for gathering food items; for feeding their young; for

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cleaning their feathers; for defending themselves; and for nest-building. They had to be tough enough to crack hard seed cases, break up nuts, tear strips off grass as well as drink.

For carnivorous birds, their bills had to be strong enough to kill mammals up to the size of antelope and tear off pieces small enough to swallow.

Look at the variety of bills: the long spear-shaped bills of the kingfisher and the herons; the long, slender, downward curved bill of the hadeda and other ibises; the hooked bill of the fiscal shrike; the powerful hooked bill of eagles and vultures; and the tiny spike-like beak of flycatchers. Look at the contrast between the almost vestigial bill of the swifts and the massive bill of the ostrich. And there's the 'wonderful' 10 litre bill of the pelican that's used for netting; and the complicated bills of many seabirds - the peculiarly complicated bill of an albatross compared with the elongated bill of the skimmer designed for skimming the water surface while the bird is in flight.

Forty years ago, I was assigned by *Reader's Digest* to write about our 10 species of kingfishers and I described witnessing a pied kingfisher at Natal's Mkuzi Game Reserve catching a fish very much larger than its bill. In fact the fish looked larger than the bird's body.

It took it by its tail and bashed it to death on a branch before jiggling it to point head first down its throat. I was with a photographer and we agreed the fish was never going to fit down the bird's throat much less fit in its stomach.

The fish went halfway down and stayed, tail in the air, for some minutes. Then with a convulsive movement it was swallowed and the bird just sat looking decidedly dyspeptic.

We thought it would stay there digesting its meal for the rest of the day but within five minutes it flew from the branch and began hovering once again above the water with its beak pointing down ready for another fish. The *RD*, in those days published from the United States, was (and is) a stickler for accuracy and required two witnesses or referees for each fact in a freelancer's article. They questioned me for some time about the incident, and then questioned the photographer. My article was suspended for a year while undergoing peer review.

A bird, to save weight, has hollow bones and its bill, to be as light as possible, contains ingenious structural devices to strengthen it. Another anatomical sacrifice a bird has to make is to dispense with teeth. Herons compensate by having backwardspointing slits in the sides of their bills so that fish, once speared and manoeuvred to face head-down, cannot slide out.

A bird's bill is composed of keratin - an outgrowth of the epidermis – similar to our hair and fingernails. Keratin has considerable strength – in fact the rhino's horn is pure keratin.


Perhaps the most powerful bills belong to the large raptors - eagles and vultures. And of the raptors the bill of the bearded vulture (lammergeyer) is probably the most powerful. With Mary, I watched one at the Witsieshoek Mountain Lodge (near the Golden Gate National Park) tackling a leg joint from an ox. Now vultures must eat fast because feeding off carcases often means competing with large predators such as lions and hyenas. The bearded vulture is a very fast feeder indeed and has an enormous gape (the hinge of the bill) for swallowing really large bones, whole. They can swallow long bones that, while one end is being digested in their stomachs, the other is still in their bill.

One of the most specialised bills is that of the flamingo which fishes in the shallows by dragging its head upside down so that its crown scrapes the ground and water flows into its bill which is lined with horny plates. This allows it to push the water out again while filtering out food items – much like how a baleen whale feeds.

Look at the contrast between the flamingo's heavy bill and that of the hadeda's slender beak, shaped for probing soft soil. Its specially adapted tip has a sensor that can detect the presence of grubs and insects deep in the soil. Stranger still is the needle-thin, up-curved bill of the pied avocet and the needle-thin down-curved bills of nectareating sunbirds.

And look at the tiny, seed-cracking conical-shaped bills of the seed-eating finches compared with the straight, strong, chiselling bill of woodpeckers and the delicate spiked bills of insectcatching birds.


It was bird bills that set Charles Darwin off, almost 200 years ago, when he landed in the Galapagos and formulated the theory of biological evolution.

It appears that a flock of South American finches, helplessly blown across the Pacific, found sanctuary among the Galapagos Islands. Over the years, they settled on separate islands, each with its individual habitats and different food opportunities. On one island, the finches evolved spiky bills for probing cactus plants, on another, they developed specialised, stubby bills for seed-eating, and on another island, they became large-billed fruit-eating birds – there are five very different adaptations altogether.

A bird's motto: provide me with a habitat – any habitat you like - and I'll handle the bill.



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Motoring

Suzuki made the proud claim 'Since 1970' on the graphics prominently displayed on the test car - that was when the first versions of this baby Giant Killer appeared on the roads.

The latest version was launched in SA recently. Boasting a bolder face, a bit more space and some extra oomph under the bonnet courtesy of a new 1.5L 4-cylinder petrol engine, it delivers 75kW and 130Nm. That's still no ball of fire, but certainly far more adequate for on-road performance.

But, that's only half the picture. The little tyke still boasts selectable 2 or 4-wheel drive and even LOW RANGE. Combine this with the excellent ground clearance and extra short overhangs and you begin to understand its uncanny ability off-road.

After being challenged by Suzuki SA, I took the test car out to a 4x4 venue for a day of great fun, to experience the off-road ability, only being stopped once more through lack of skill, rather than any lack of ability on the part of the Jimny.

The interior has been ugraded, modernised and improved with many extras that were lacking in the previous version, most notable being the touchscreen infotainment system fitted as standard to the GLX version tested.

The Jimny is simply one of those cars that you either get or you don't. You either want it or you don't! A 12-month waiting list in SA suggests that many buyers do!!

The base GA version with identical mechanics retails for R269 900 and the more luxurious GLX version as tested retails at R305 900. A GLX automatic is also available.

The GLX includes a 4-year/60 000km service plan as standard.

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Gardening

THE SHOT HOLE BORER CRISIS

These beetles seem to be a problem in SA at the moment.

The polyphagous Shot Hole Borer (PSHB), also known as *Euwallacea Fornicatus*, is able to cause a great deal of damage to our environment, and it has recently been discovered in South Africa.

These beetles, which are approximately 2mm long, are native to South East Asia, which means that the beetle has no natural predator in South Africa and so it can spread like wildfire. To make matters worse, this beetle has a symbiotic relationship with certain types of fungi, like *Fusarium Euwallacea*. The fungus is the beetles' main source of food in addition to its being the main cause associated with the wilting of trees. The beetle is believed to use other types of fungi to help with colonisation of infected trees.

The Shot Hole Borer, along with the associated fungi, has caused tremendous damage to trees across the US (specifically California) and regions of the Middle East. Considering the devastation caused by this beetle in Sandton and in Knysna, (currently infesting over 200 indigenous tree species from 28 different plant families), this beetle could cause one of South Africa's largest ecological tragedies.

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HOW DOES THE BEETLE INFEST THE TREE?

The beetle, itself, does not kill the tree, but the fungus accompanying the beetle does. The fungus infects the tree's vascular system which then affects and/or stops the flow of water and nutrients within the tree.

HOW TO IDENTIFY THE SHOT HOLE BORER

Unfortunately, the beetles are the size of sesame seeds and can be hard to spot, however, you can identify an infected tree by looking for the following signs:

- Wilting or missing leaves
- Dead or dying branches
- Entry or exit holes in the bark (the size of a pen tip) – these holes may have staining around them
- Shotgun-like lesions on the bark at entry or exit hole
- Sugar Volcanoes on the bark at entry or exit hole
- Blotches of oozing resin on the bark at entry or exit holes
- Wood frass (wood powder) on the bark at entry or exit holes.

WHAT CAN I DO ABOUT PSHB?

The PSHB beetle drills very deeply into the wood, which is why no remedy has, as yet, been discovered for this pest. At this stage, KOINOR is recommended, but results are, unfortunately, not guaranteed.

The public can also aid in the management of the spreading of this infestation by reporting any signs to FABI (Forestry and Biotechnology Institute).

The discovery of this beetle in South Africa is a major concern to foresters, farmers, tree fellers and landscapers as these beetles are very aggressive and are known as tree killers.

We have a large biodiversity in South Africa hosting 299 species of mammals and 858 species of birds, all depending on trees for their food and shelter. It is our duty to take care of the natural beauty we are blessed with.

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Life Talk

SLEEPING CAN BE TRICKY!

One of the concerns raised by teenagers when addressing issues that they are encountering is to do with sleep and sleep-related problems. Nicoleen Davies, director of Life Talk Forum, provides the following helpful information.

We all struggle to sleep at some point in time, but sleep is something that needs our attention because it is so important. Sleep is food for the brain. Important body functions and brain activity occur during sleep.

Teens need 8 - 10 hours of sleep to function best. Lack of sleep affects your mood, so you must prioritise sleep and focus on healthy sleeping habits. Most importantly, chronic sleep deprivation can affect your mental well-being and reduce your academic performance at school.

WHAT AFFECTS SLEEP?

There are various factors that come into play - stress, the blue lights on our devices, medication side effects, substance abuse, physical discomfort (a stuffy nose or headache), emotional troubles (family problems or relationship difficulties), an uncomfortable sleeping environment (a room that's too hot, cold, bright, or noisy) and mental health issues.

- Sleep disorders are another factor. Sleep apnoea is when you temporarily stop breathing during sleep. This could be because of enlarged tonsils or adenoids, being overweight or obese. Restless legs is another sleep disorder affecting teens, as is sleep paralysis.
- Smartphones and other devices used around bed time reduce sleep time. The short-wave blue lights on

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devices can delay the release of sleepinducing melatonin, they increase your alertness and reset your internal body clock, meaning you won't get sleepy. Fluorescent bulbs and LED lights can have the same effect. (According to a study by Vic Health and the Sleep Health Foundation, teens who put down their smartphones an hour before bed gain an extra 21 minutes of sleep a night - that's one hour and 45 minutes over the school week.)

- Puberty hormones shift a teen's body clock by about one or two hours, making you sleepier one to two hours later. This nightly 'sleep debt' leads to chronic sleep deprivation.
- Insufficient sleep causes your brain to become more active, making you less able to fall asleep.

What can you do?

- Aim to get 8 10 hours of sleep each day. It's hard with the school workload and sport, so try to plan ahead when you can.
- Try to be consistent: go to sleep and wake at more or less the same time school nights and weekends.
- Opt for relaxing before bed. Try mindfulness activities, reading, and taking a warm shower or bath, instead of turning on the TV, phone or computer.
- Cut down on caffeine or other stimulants, as well as soft drinks or

energy drinks before bed time.

- Avoid playing violent video games or movies before bed time.
- Sleep in on weekends to try and make up for lost sleep!
- Make sure your bedroom is dark.
- Do things to reduce stress eat well, exercise, have down-time with friends, laugh!
- Try to add on 10, 15, even 30 minutes of sleep a day – over a week that could mean a lot of extra sleep benefit.

Take a nap!

Take a 1 hour nap (not more) in the afternoon – it will improve your brain functioning and memory, will increase your alertness, performance and productivity, all whilst reducing stress. It also boosts your immune system.

When you need medical help

If you are getting enough rest at night, but are still feeling tired during the day, it's a good idea to visit the doctor. Excessive tiredness can be caused by all sorts of health problems, not just difficulties with sleep.
