
WATERFALL



FEATHERED FRIENDS CAUSE A FLUTTER AT WATERFALL

ou may remember that not so long ago, a little bird called the Spotted Crake put Waterfall into the record books when it 'flew in' for a six-week stay. The bird is so rare that news of its presence quickly flew across the country, and twitchers were literally jetting up from Cape Town to enjoy the sighting.

Resident, Ron Searle, only had to hop around the corner to see it, as he lives in Waterfall Valley and is a key member of the Waterfall Bird Club. "The Spotted Crake was skulking at the entrance to Waterfall Village Estate, where there's a water feature with a couple of large

ponds," he says. "It used to hide in the reeds at the edge of the pond at night, and during the day it wandered up and down looking for food. The bird was there for six weeks, during which time about 1 500 people came to see it. Every morning you'd see people with their massive cameras, or sitting there picnicking waiting for it to appear."

Birders get to hear about such rare sightings via the internet, with fans eager to share the news and the most dedicated happy to jump on a plane to catch a glimpse. The 1 500 spectators at Waterfall set a record for a bird sighting in South Africa, Ron says.

The Waterfall Bird Club meets once a month at various times, depending on the activity. Talks by guest speakers take place in the Waterfall Hills auditorium, and have included a discussion on the damage that plastic pollution does to birdlife, and sessions by the well-known bird book author lan Sinclair. Often the group enjoys an outing, which may be a ramble along the Jukskei River, or further afield to places like Rietvlei Nature Reserve.

Ron is the ultimate authority on birding in Waterfall, and records all the species spotted on the Estate. The club was already active when he moved in five years ago, and by then its members

had spotted 115 different species. Now the list is up to 240. "During the five years I have been here, 125 additional species have been added," he says. "Some are just visitors that we may never see again, and others we see every day."

As an avid birder himself, Ron has literally travelled the world in search of birdlife, including China, the Amazon, Australia, Alaska, many African countries, Japan, Arctic Norway/Finland, Antarctica and many others. He's planning a trip to Chile and Peru this year.

The secret of being a good birder doesn't start with the eyes, but with the ears, he says. "The art of bird watching is to actually listen, and to be able to identify a bird from its call. Once you become good at identifying the call, everything else falls into place."

Many other sightings have delighted the Waterfall Bird Club recently. One is a rare migratory Green Sandpiper that drops in every year, taking a breather in transit from Eurasia to its final winter destination elsewhere in RSA.

"It was a fantastic summer for the Cuckoo family, with Great-spotted, Jacobin, Red-chested and Common Cuckoo visiting the Estates," says Ron. "An adult and immature Black-necked Grebe spent two or three weeks at the Village Dam, a juvenile Black-backed Puffback was spotted on the Country Estate, and an Icterine Warbler was recorded during a walk on the Country Estate, when 94 species were seen."

A solitary, young Arrow-marked Babbler was also spotted, probably a male on the lookout for a new territory. Hottentot Teal, Fulvous Duck, African Pied Wagtail, Spurwinged Geese and Orange-breasted Waxbills have all been clocked up this year too.





WINTER DISEASES IN CHILDREN

Should I be worried?

inter presents a huge challenge to parents with small babies and/or young children, and unfortunately, they can do nothing much to alter the course of diseases that occur during the season. Understanding the basics about the different types of common winter diseases, including common signs and symptoms, management, prevention and control will however assist them in navigating through this period.

DEFINITIONS FOR COMMON WINTER DISEASES

- 1. Coryza inflammation of the lining in the nasal cavity, better known as the common cold. It is derived from the Greek word Ko'ruza meaning nasal mucus.
- **2. Influenza** an infectious disease caused by a virus called influenza virus, it is sometimes referred to as flu.
- **3. Allergic rhinitis** inflammation of the nose, sometimes referred to as hay-fever.

- **4. Bronchiolitis** inflammation of the bronchioles (small breathing pipes).
- **5. Asthma** chronic inflammation of the bronchi (larger breathing pipes).

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Coryza and influenza are often confused by the lay public. When most folk say they have flu they are actually referring to coryza or the common cold. Symptoms include a sore throat, cough, runny and/or blocked nose and possible fever. The common virus causing coryza is the rhino-virus.

Influenza has similar symptoms to the common cold however influenza can in addition have symptoms of myalgia (painful muscles), rigors (feeling hot and cold with shivering), feeling miserable and unable to get up and go to school. Influenza can result in complications like pneumonia, ear infections and sepsis.

Both of these diseases will work their way out of the body but the common problem is that patients tend to think an antibiotic will solve the problems. An antibiotic is only useful if bacteria are involved.

Bronchiolitis is common in children under two years of age. It presents with a cough, fast breathing, difficulty in breathing, chest in-drawing and fever. This is commonly caused by a virus called respiratory syncytial virus in 90% of the cases. Other viruses like parainfluenza and viruses causing a common cold and influenza may be involved.

Allergic rhinitis – the name hay-fever, as it is commonly referred to, comes from symptoms occurring during hay harvesting season when pollen is in the air. Patients present with a cough, especially at night, itchy and runny nose with clear secretions which sometimes can be greenish in colour, watery and itchy eyes and sometimes swelling of the eyelids. Patients can in addition present with a tired-looking face, with dark discoloration under the eyelids.

Asthma presents with a cough that is worse at night, a tight chest, wheezing and exercise-induced symptoms.

Approximately 40% of patients with asthma have allergic rhinitis and so these conditions co-exist and form part of what is called a united airway. Recording the history of asthma is very important as the chest is usually clear on examination by the practitioner unless the patient has acute symptoms, so asthma is thus often missed.

HOW DO WE MANAGE THESE CONDITIONS?

Common cold – can be managed with symptomatic treatment i.e. nasal decongestants, controlling fever, good food and good quality of sleep – eventually, the virus will work itself out of the system.

Influenza – this is symptomatically treated, as with the common cold. Having a flu vaccination is highly recommended before the flu season starts (from April in South Africa).



Allergic rhinitis – is treated with nasal cortisone spray and a non-sedating antihistamine.

Bronchiolitis – is also symptomatically treated, and if the respiratory distress is worse and the saturation is less than 92% in room air, patients might benefit from admission to hospital and receive oxygen via a nasal cannula (tube).

Asthma – treatment entails controller pump inhalation and steroids via a spacer in young children, and a reliever in case of emergencies.

PREVENTION AND CONTROL

The best way to control diseases is good nutrition, avoiding environmental pollution and tobacco smoke, and living in a healthy environment which includes regular handwashing to reduce the spread of infections. A flu vaccination before the flu season starts can assist in preventing flu. Asthma can be well controlled using inhaled steroids, and allergic rhinitis, through intranasal steroids.

Bronchiolitis cannot be prevented per se, but the national guidelines


recommend the use of a prophylaxis before the RSV season starts, for high risk patients, (for example premature babies, based on defined criteria), and patients with congenital cyanotic heart disease (when a baby is born with an abnormally developed heart and blood vessels resulting in low oxygen supply to the organs). Generally, no antibiotics should be used unless there is evidence of bacterial infection.


CONCLUSION

Common cold, influenza and bronchiolitis are caused by viruses and require no antibiotics to treat them. Influenza is the most fatal of the three conditions, especially when it results in complications such as pneumonia requiring treatment in an intensive care unit. This is more common in patients whose immune systems are compromised. Yearly vaccination with a flu shot will alter the severity of the disease. A prophylaxis that is useful for RSV bronchiolitis is also recommended.

Allergic rhinitis and asthma are easily controlled with intranasal and inhaled corticosteroids. Children not on treatment can get sicker when exposed to a viral infection, which may lead to the need for hospitalisation. There is generally no need for antibiotics for a viral infection.

When most folk say they have flu they are actually referring to coryza or the common cold.



hen my husband and I received an invitation to cycle around Mauritius, we jumped at the opportunity. Being entrepreneurs, we know how important resilience is in life and decided to take our two children with us. They are both very sporty but most training sessions and matches are 45 – 60 minutes. Training

for and participating in this tour would require dedication, commitment and many hours on the bike - a fantastic opportunity to build resilience!

Once we signed up for the tour, the hard work started. We discovered the Watt bikes in the Waterfall Gym which helped us with short, intensive bike training sessions. Over the years, we've learned the importance of cross training and that's why focussed, biweekly gym training sessions with Waterfall personal trainer, Refentse Makgolane, in the Waterfall Gym formed an integral part of our training programme. The highlight of our training was definitely the weekend rides on the Waterfall Mountain Bike Trail. The trail winds through Waterfall Country Estate and Waterfall Country Village and is exclusively used by mountain bikers and trail runners.

The kids weren't always excited to train, especially when they had to get up early on weekends for long rides at Northern Farm and The Cradle but this is when they learnt to focus and keep going.

Nutrition is a very important part of participating in endurance events and we tried out a number of different energy bars, gummies and energy drinks until we each found our favourites to use on the tour. We consulted with Waterfall's in-house mountain bike expert, Kirsty Searle, on bike set-up and some technical skills and after months of training we were ready.

We have been to Mauritius a couple of times but exploring it on a bike

takes you to places you wouldn't otherwise get to. Our group was made up of mountain bikers from all over South Africa and also included a lawyer from Dubai and the sponsor's riders from Mauritius.

We arrived on Thursday, 24 May at the Shandrani Hotel at Blue Bay where we spent the first two nights.

Day two took us across the long Flic en Flac beach and through Le Caudan in Port Louis to Trou-aux Biches near Grand Baie in the north, where we stayed for the next two nights.

We met for drinks every evening before supper for the day's "fines" to be awarded. Fines were awarded to





My husband is an experienced mountain biker but this was the first multi-day event that the kids and I took part in. The training and preparation paid off as the kids rode with the leaders of our group while I helped to keep our group from catching up with the faster group. We all got fined for falling but more egos were bruised than skin.

We are very fortunate to live in an Estate with so many sporting facilities. Most of our preparation was done in the safe and secure environment on our doorstep. We noticed that many of the residents cycle on the cement paths instead of the mountain bike trails. I encourage you to try out the trails. There are a couple of technical sections, but if you don't want to ride them, you could plan your route around





What I found brilliant about this place is that you can keep going there and have something new and different





WEST COAST NATIONAL PARK ... JUST TESTING



t first it looked like the top of a Moorish desert settlement, its stucco finish glowing in the late afternoon sun. Its roof tops had, unexpectedly and incongruously, appeared above the low-lying Cape scrub.

This was our first glimpse of Duinepos, a huddle of a dozen square-cut'chalets' which was to be our accommodation for two nights inside the West Coast National Park, 120km north of Cape Town.

It's a strange park to us visitors who hail from the landlocked interior: no big trees and no elephants or rhino and no big predators. You can get out anywhere and walk about quite safely without being eaten by anything interesting.

There are some serious trails – from an hour in length to six hours (14km) linking the enormous Langebaan lagoon to the wild, uninhabited coast where the frigid Benguela Current, coming up from the Antarctic, makes swimming impossible unless one is a sea lion or one of the penguins that sometimes cram together on the beach like holiday crowds.

Out at sea are whales and dolphins. As for birds, one is never sure what might turn up. The chance of surprises, especially from September when tens of thousands of migrants begin to arrive from the top half of the world, keeps one scanning not just the beach but the enormous expanse of the Langebaan Lagoon.

We were there in May. Not an ideal month. The early winter weather does

things in the Cape that would not be tolerated inland. It can rain for hours - cold, wet stuff, not like the interior's short-sharp warm summer rains which at least know when to stop.

Fortunately, the weather was kind when we visited, but cold. Noticing a pile of firewood in our small chalet I quickly lit a fire in the generously-sized hearth. Alas, no matter how much I pushed the fire back, we were smoked out and gave up. We asked the next day for a more amenable chalet - one with a view. Ten of Duinespos' huts were unoccupied and the one we were moved to was excellent and we wondered why we'd been allocated an inferior chalet in the first place. So when booking, ask for a chalet with a view.

We were in the Cape for the Franschhoek Literary Festival and decided to delay our return to the Highveld so we could check out the West Coast Reserve. Just testing - for we plan to return there in spring when the migrants arrive – a seasonal wildlife phenomenon that attracts birders from across the world.

There's an added attraction in spring: an area adjacent to the park's north-

west perimeter - the Posberg Flower Reserve – puts on a spectacular show similar to the annual spectacle of the Namaqualand daisies. August is when the ground-hugging succulents of Posberg erupt in great splashes of vivid colour, each of the millions of flowers, eager to attract pollinators before the sun withers them, producing a competitive frenzy of shimmering colours. The general impression of the West Coast Park is of a 32 000ha rolling fynboscovered landscape in the centre of which is the huge Langebaan Lagoon. There are frequent sightings of the world's largest antelope, the eland, and the largest bird, the ostrich. More difficult to spot are the Cape mountain zebras, gemsbok and kudu and, of course, the smaller mammals such as the bontebok, springbok, steenbok,

red hartebeest, duiker, caracal, African wild cat and bat eared foxes. In summer, tortoises seem to pour from the earth.

There are large areas of marshy wetlands where, even though it was winter, we still saw a nice variety of waders: whimbrels, grey plovers, chestnut-banded plovers, oyster catchers... plus a host of ducks: shelducks, black ducks, and yellow-billed ducks (hundreds upon hundreds of yellow bills). Scattered in groups across the water were greater flamingos, honking like geese and high-stepping like ballerinas.

The potential in summer is 250 species of birds, one of them being the curlew sandpiper which flies in from its breeding ground 15 000km away in Siberia.

The park was established in 1985 to conserve the Langebaan Lagoon which was listed as a protected marine ecosystem almost half-a-century ago. The park - including the islands in Saldanha Bay - is now a Ramsar site

and therefore the whole is protected by international agreement.

For us, a major highlight was a dawn visit to Abrahamskraal Waterhole – 10 minutes from Duinepos – in the middle of a moorland. Here, in the half light, we were greeted at the start of the boardwalk by a magnificent specimen of black korhaan. We entered the hide and raised the shutter to find maybe 50 spoonbills peacefully at rest – except for two that endlessly played with a torn-off length of reed – and I mean played. They remained absorbed with it long after the rest of the flock flew off.

The best of the park's four excellent hides was, in our view, the Seeberg hide at the north-eastern end of the lagoon. One approaches it along a winding, kilometre-long boardwalk across the salt marsh. From it we watched 20 or 30 species of gulls, terns, waders, ducks and flamingos. The birds are pushed towards the park's hides as the water level rises with the tides. When it gets too deep they fly off only to return

as soon as the tide recedes and they can feed in the shallow water again.

The reserve's Cape Dutch restaurant called the Geelbek (after the yellow bill duck) is a handsome piece of heritage. It was built on the lagoon in 1744 when lions and elephants roamed the area. It's known for its traditional fare – fresh ingredients often from the local veld go into its bobotie, Cape Malay chicken curry and lamb curry, denningsvleis (an old slave recipe) and ostrich burgers, snoektart, and dishes involving local mussels, hake and calamari – and there's pumpkin pie and cheese cake...

Geelbek is a popular wedding venue with vows being said in Churchaven's old church on the beach across the lagoon.

FOOTNOTE: One can hire kayaks and, for the bike trails, bicycles. There are a few isolated self-catering cottages and attractive beaches for picnicking.

TEST REVIEW:

PORSCHE PANAMERA 4S SPORT TURISMO

Within a very brief few minutes of commencing my test period with this gleaming machine, I understood exactly why the Porsche Panamera is the reigning South African Car of the Year 2018.





W A T E R F A L L

The Panamera offers everything that the discerning driver could ever desire plus the performance and handling true to the Porsche name.

Many purists were aghast when Porsche launched both the Cayenne SUV and the Panamera executive sedan, citing the old argument that the only true Porsche is the 911. Whilst I agree that the 911 must be deemed to be the definitive Porsche, expanding the range has proven to be a very sound business decision for the marque.

Many of these same purists seem to forget that there have been numerous previous proposals for 4-door versions of the 911 over the years. Sadly, none progressed beyond prototypes and show cars.

The second generation Panamera was launched this year with some subtle styling changes and, as always, many updates. Porsche also introduced the Sport Turismo variant into the range. In the past, this may have been described as a 'shooting brake' body style - not quite a station wagon but with an extended

rear roofline and slightly squared tailgate as opposed to the hatchback style of the other versions. The revised styling creates a bit more headroom in the rear and a touch more load space in the vehicle.

Engines and drivetrain are common to both body styles - the test car was the 4S version. It's powered by a 2.9L twin turbo V6 petrol engine delivering 324kW and 550Nm through a highly sophisticated 4-wheel drive system, to ensure blazing performance, handling and road holding. This was further enhanced on the test car with the optional rear axle steering system including power steering plus.

It must be noted that the Panamera is a very large executive saloon, yet it somehow hides its bulk when you are behind the wheel and is an extremely easy car to drive in everyday circumstances. The sheer smoothness stands out and, I believe, that it matches up to any competitor

in this department. Then you take into account the schizophrenic nature of the beast if you engage sport or sport+ modes and unleash its true character – it's still refined but capable of incredibly rapid transport and handling excellence. Items like reverse cameras with 360 degree view and overhead view make parking a cinch.

A criticism of the previous generation was the plethora of buttons on the centre console. This has been resolved by the use of haptic switches around the gearshift controlling most functions, and the exceptionally large centre screen offering the driver every vehicle setting as well as all comfort features.

One of my first tests on every test vehicle that I drive is how quickly and easily my phone links to the vehicle. The Panamera was among the quickest and most seamless that I have experienced.

Looking at those who would be relegated to the rear, this caters for two extremely pampered customers with space to lounge and the opportunity to each set climate control to suit. The ride comfort is sublime, as it should be.

In summary, this is a vehicle that offers everything that the discerning driver could ever desire plus the performance and handling true to the Porsche name. At a base price of R1,7 million (and R1,94 million for the model tested), it is not cheap yet it is highly competitive in its market category.

little gem that thrives on revs, so it's perfectly matched to the handling characteristics of the sporty little car. Interestingly, the output is 92kW in manual guise but 74kW when matched to the smooth 6 speed auto transmission. According to Ford, this is done to better match the engine and transmission for smoother driving.

round 40% of new car sales in South Africa fall into the small hatchback or B segment, so it's no surprise that such attention is focused on this segment by all major manufacturers, resulting in some hot competition.

The Ford Fiesta has always been a leader in the segment and is known as the 'drivers' car' with very good reason. After the recent launch of the 8th generation Fiesta in Europe, it has now reached our shores.

Like many of its competitors, Ford has followed the ethos of evolution over revolution so the car is still instantly recognisable as a Fiesta, although it has grown a bit in size, especially the boot space, and it has a slightly new face with bigger changes to the rear

end. Overall, I considered the look to be neat and a little more grown up.

The bigger changes are inside the car. The old cell-phone type centre stack is now gone and replaced by a much more modern-looking fascia with a large touchscreen infotainment system dominating the space. Ford has simplified the range by now only offering Trend and Titanium specifications, both being extremely well equipped and, with Ford's marketleading SYNC 3 infotainment system included, buyers are never left wanting.

The engines have been carried over from the previous generation – as it has been voted the best small engine in the world for the last 6 consecutive years, why change? The 1L Eco boost turbo petrol engine is a

The 1.5 diesel feels far stronger than the quoted 55kW with its 185Nm of torque giving fantastic economy and drivability.

On the road, both offer smooth power, excellent handling and behaviour while comfortably cruising on the open road. The launch route was from Johannesburg through to Sun City and I experienced both the petrol with auto transmission as well as the diesel version. Both provided an excellent drive and were also extremely happy when pushed a bit to test the handling characteristics.

Priced from around R260 000, any buyer in this segment must check out the Fiesta before making their final decision.

CHILD ABUSE

An epidemic of alarming proportions

he abuse of children knows no social boundaries. This type of abuse happens as much in wealthy families as it does in poor communities where living conditions are dire. "The statistics are not looking great," says Professor Tanya Marie Robinson, who is a forensics specialist and Ambassador for the Teddy Bear Foundation (TBF). "The latest reports show that the number of violent crimes against children is very high. What's concerning is that child abuse is still very much under-reported. Two out of every three cases is not reported and one can understand why. For the abused children, the family is their only resource, so if the abuse happens in the home, (and more than 7 out of 10 children are abused by a family member or someone known to them), after they have reported the abuse, they still have to go home and face the same conditions."

"Our systems let us down. The Department of Social Development doesn't have the resources, which is why the work that TBF is doing is so important. TBF is pretty much the only place where children who have been abused can be forensically assessed."

THE FUNCTIONS OF THE TEDDY BEAR FOUNDATION

It's a well-known method of working with abused children – to give them a teddy bear or a doll both as comfort and as a way to better understand the extent of the abuse that they have suffered as they show where on the toy they were touched or hurt. The Teddy Bear is the organisation's symbol of comfort and hope, but the services are a lot more extensive and involved. Run by a team of dedicated directors under the leadership of Dr Shaheda Omar. this NPO has a network of support services that cover Medico-legal Examinations, Forensic Assessments, Psychological Evaluations, Therapeutic Counselling and Support, and help with the prosecution process.

"Tackling child abuse head on is an expensive process," explains Professor Robinson. "The cost is in excess of R15 000 per child and it can take up to two years for a case to get to court. But we go even further than prosecution, we aim to reduce the incidences of child abuse where possible so we also run programmes to rehabilitate the offenders and a support programme, SPARC, (Support Programme for

Abuse-Reactive Children), aimed at stopping them from becoming potential offenders themselves."

SAFE HOUSES

TBF has a medical examination department at the Charlotte Maxexe Academic Hospital (Joburg Gen) in Parktown and there is a safe house in Braamfontein where a limited number of the children are accommodated if the social workers anticipate the potential of further abuse happening in their homes. Alternatively, they are sent to other places of safety while the court case is prepared.

FUNDING

TBF ambassadors are an essential part of keeping the organisation alive and functional. A series of fundraisers are held, such as the gala dinner that's taking place at the Michelangelo Hotel this winter. Fortunately, the dinner is sold out, but many more events are needed to help with the vital work that TBF performs. WHAT TBF DOES

The organisation was started during 1986 in response to an urgent need for medical examinations for sexually abused children. Treating child abuse is a highly specialised field of expertise, requiring the highest level of sensitivity, care and confidence in making diagnoses and the subsequent decisions, thereby ensuring the best interests of the child.

Over 30 years, TBF has grown into a unique and fully-fledged holistic service for abused children.
All services are at no cost to those who need them and are unreservedly available to everyone.

VICTIM SUPPORT SERVICES Medico-legal Examinations

• The Teddy Bear Foundation's Medico-legal Clinic is a specialised medical facility for children who have been abused or neglected and is also a training service for medical professionals working in the child protection field. It is based within the Charlotte Maxexe Academic Hospital, and is run by a multidisciplinary team of paediatricians, doctors, forensic nurses, social workers and volunteers.

Forensic Assessments

• Forensic assessments form the basis of court proceedings in convicting perpetrators of violence against children. They take the form of a structured process where the child is engaged through various techniques, by TBF's qualified social workers. The aim is to elicit information from the child victim regarding the



details of an alleged crime, and then to verify these through collateral sources, such as witnesses and other people known to the victim.

Psychological Evaluations

• This service was established specifically for children with cognitive disabilities for the purpose of providing them with fair access to the criminal justice system. In the context of sexual abuse cases, the psychological assessment that has to be conducted depends on the psychological questions posed by the court. In most cases, the psychological assessments are aimed at determining the victims' mental age as opposed to their chronological age, their capacity to testify with regard to an alleged crime, and the impact of the trauma on the victims.

Therapeutic Counselling and Support

· Child abuse causes trauma and emotional scars that can have a negative impact on a child's development and result in longterm consequences. Every victim of child abuse and their family is provided with the opportunity to receive therapeutic counselling and support. This enables the child and family to assume a sense of mastery to cope with the trauma. Supportive counselling is also provided to the caregivers of those children who have been abused, as the better equipped the caregivers are to cope with the trauma, the better they are able to support the child through the process.



Court Preparation and Support

• The Court Preparation and Support programme was established in June 1997. It focuses on providing children and parents with skills, emotional support and legal knowledge in preparation for their appearance in court. The programme is processoriented in that it provides support for the children and their families from the moment they enter the programme, right through the often lengthy legal process, with debriefing thereafter.

OUTREACH School awareness programme (SAFE)

• The SAFE programme is a prevention model creating awareness in learners and educators about their rights and responsibilities. This expands on acceptable and unacceptable behaviour. This programme also has a protocol training manual for educators on the identification, management and legislation pertaining to cases of child abuse.

Sexual Violence Initiative in Schools (SEVISA)

 This project addresses genderbased violence in schools - it focuses on zero tolerance to sexual violence in the schools.

DIVERSION Support Programme for Abuse Reactive Children

• The SPARC programme gives the children a second chance in life by diverting them away from the criminal justice system and stopping them from becoming potential offenders.



THE GOWN OF HUMILIATION

Some hospitals just haven't got it. Sensitivity I mean.

Author, Janet Hurst-Nicholson, tells me how she went to have a mole removed but had to take everything off and put on one of those gowns that are specially designed to humiliate. To begin with, they tie up at the back but no matter how you tie them you know your backside is on view and there you are in the outpatients' area filled with people who have nothing better to do than watch.

Janet described the embarrassment of having to answer all the medical questions within the hearing of the audience. "Fortunately I don't have any embarrassing conditions but I did hear a few from others and I was able to compare my blood pressure with everyone else's."

"I had taken a pen, crossword and glasses and was happily filling in the answers when they took me off in the wheelchair and said I would be in the theatre waiting area for about 10 minutes. They curtained me off except for a small gap and everyone who walked past looked in and gave me a friendly smile and some asked if I was OK. And there I sat, and sat."

"To make matters worse, I now had nothing to read. There weren't even any posters; not even instructions on the various mysterious machines. Just a cupboard marked 'Blankets'. I was going to meditate but I knew if I closed my eyes they'd ask, even more earnestly, if I was all right."

"The ten minutes went to about 15 and they were bringing people back from the theatre. Then the doctor came to explain there would be a delay of another 20 minutes - which would entail sitting staring at the curtain. Eventually someone took pity on me and brought me a newspaper – but I didn't have my glasses!"

I can certainly sympathise. In the past, I have, a few times, had to wear that Gown of Humiliation. The gown was designed in mediaeval times when convicted witches were forced to parade in them.

And I too have sat in a small cubicle with only the curtain to look at – and experienced an acute dose of stage fright. I could hear a large crowd outside and dreaded the curtain being pulled aside and having to face the public in my vestal virgin outfit.

When eventually my curtain call came, there, a metre away, was a well-known business leader on a stretcher. That, I thought, was even worse – to lay there looking up at the throng. I thought of greeting him but then I would have had to ask, "How are you?" which would have been a silly question seeing he was lying on his back waiting for somebody to stick a knife in him. And he would have had to ask me how I was and with all these people around I would have had to tell him of my imminent undignified procedure.

I've never been lucky enough to be in for, for instance, an interesting compound fracture.
